

COUNTY INCOME ON O-C LANDS \$13 THOUSAND

Otto C. F. Krueger, district forester in charge of the Medford district of the O. and C. administration, states that Klamath county will receive \$2,444.82 in lieu of current taxes on the O. and C. lands this year, and in addition, \$3805.48 on account of delinquent payments which were due in years prior to the creation of the O. and C. administration in the General Land office. The total income of the county this year from the O. and C. forests is the sum of the two items, or \$13,050.28. The county revenue from this source has risen steadily year by year since 1938 when the O. and C. lands were placed under management by the General Land office.

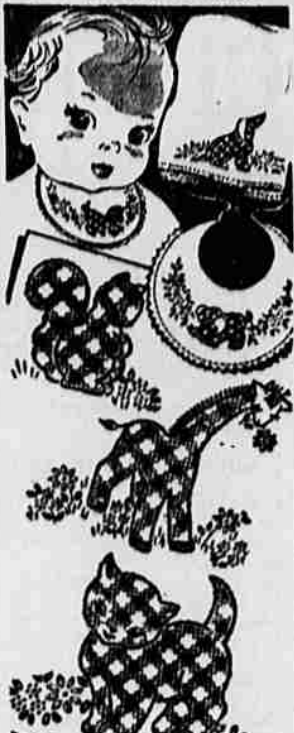
Timber cutting on the O. and C. lands is now proceeding at about the rate of 500 million board feet annually, which is the amount of the sustained yield which these lands can be expected to produce perpetually. County revenue from this source has risen, therefore, about as high as it can be expected to go.

County interest in revenues received by the county in lieu of taxes from the O. and C. lands may be used for roads, schools, or other county purposes. There are 18 counties in Oregon which participate in the earnings of the O. and C. lands, 50 per cent of which is divided among them. The counties participate proportionately to the assessed valuation of the O. and C. lands in each of the counties. Each county regularly receives its pro-rata share whether or not any O. and C. timber is sold in that particular county. This arrangement is helpful in producing regularity and stability of county income in the land grant counties.

By virtue of this arrangement, each of the counties has a direct interest in any action on cut-over or fire-ravaged O. and C. lands in other counties, taken to restore forests on them and increase their earning power. Each acre of good Douglas fir land, while kept at work growing timber, is producing an average annual income of at least \$1 and storing it up like money in the savings bank until the timber is ready for cutting.

Where millions of acres are involved, it becomes a serious matter if any large percentage of the area is allowed to remain idle and unproductive for any considerable period of years. The average sustained yield of timber and county income are both seriously reduced when much area is allowed to remain unproductive. The counties, therefore, have good reason to be interested in the expanding activities of the O. and C. administration to bring cut-over and fire-damaged lands back to full production as speedily as possible.

Mr. and Mrs. Doremus had planned to spend the winter in Miami, Fla., with their daughter, Mrs. Byron Shollenberger, formerly of this city. Mrs. Shollenberger will arrive by plane in Medford early Friday morning, and a son, Warren Doremus, is expected from Seattle Thursday afternoon.

CIO PROPOSES SHIFT IN WLB

BOSTON, Nov. 12 (P)—The CIO proposed today that the War Labor Board shift its operations to an industry-wide basis to prevent a possible breakdown in the board's machinery.

The convention also pledged the support of the United Nations' new offensive and, vigorously, voted by President Philip Murray, voted unqualified backing to Harry Bridges in his fight against deportation.

Stating that the War Labor Board "now stands at the heart of the industrial relations machinery of the nation," a resolution adopted by the convention expressed apprehension that the thousands of cases pouring into the board because of its expanded duties might "destroy its entire effectiveness." Labor has equal voice and voting representation on the board with management and the public.

Lee Pressman, CIO counsel and secretary of the Resolutions committee, added orally that the industry-wide policy could be modified to a regional basis in cases where the latter policy appeared more practical and feasible.

ICKES FAVORS OIL CONSUMPTION CUT

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12 (P)—Petroleum Coordinator Harold L. Ickes disclosed today he had recommended a cut of nearly 12 per cent in petroleum consumption in the 17 rationed east coast states.

The recommendation was made to War Production Board Chairman Donald M. Nelson, who has authority to direct the office of price administration to make the cut.

The reduction in gasoline consumption, he added, would save about 80,000 barrels a day, or "something like 20 to 25 per cent," and reduce consumption of light and heavy fuel oil by 50,000 barrels a day.

The reduction is necessary, Ickes said, because shipment to the east by railroad, pipeline and barge are now running almost 200,000 barrels a day below the requirement of approximately 1,400,000 barrels a day under present rationing, and need of oil for military purposes is increasing greatly.
