US DESTROYER, 2 OTHER SHIPS HIT IN BATTLE

bringing to 506 the total of Japanese aircraft reported destroyed thus far in the Solomons. 11 Jap Ships Down

American submarines and bombing planes, striking at Japanese supply lines sprawled across the South Pacific put at least 11 cargo or transport vessels out of action in the battle for the Solomon Islands and New Guinea.

Seven of the equipment and troop-carrying craft were sent to the bottom by torpedoes launched from far-ranging submarines.

Heavy bombers caught four others in the harbor at the Japanese Buin-Faisi base in the northern Solomons. All were damaged.

Their attack occurred early yesterday morning (Solomons time). On land in the Solomons a lull apparently has developed in the battle between American troops and Japanese invaders seeking to regain Henderson airfield from which bombers can control many shipping lanes.

In New Guinea, however, the battling of ground troops continues to pile up victories for American and allied forces. Gen. Douglas A. MacArthur reported the enemy was retreating from the Oivi-Gorari area where the Japanese had sought to gain control in the Owen Stanley mountain area. The retreat might develop into a disorderly rout, official reports indicated, for the Japs have abandoned much equipment and left behind some troops.

Rommel Abandons Tobruk; Withdrawal From Tunis Hinted

and damage to a southbound schooner in the central Mediterranean, only one allied plane was missing.

Air scouts said the enemy still was moving westward from Tobruk as fast as his transport could carry him.

Much of his remaining stores apparently were left in Tobruk, destroyed and burned. When RAF raiders bombed the port Wednesday night they saw more than 100 fires, many in clusters and brilliant white-like burning explosives.

The Germans acknowledged that they had set the torch thoughtfully to all they had to leave at Tobruk, but that an undisclosed amount of artillery and armored equipment was saved for "later on" where Rommel has decided on a last stand.

The communique did not elaborate on the indication that the axis was fleeing from Tunisia, but only yesterday allied sources had reported that German reinforcements were being flown in to the French protectorate to meet the combined American-British force rapidly approaching it from Algeria.

With Tobruk, a vital and normally defensible position, already in British hands there was no indication where Nazi Field Marshal Erwin Rommel might try—if at all—to halt his retreat.

The British already have pushed him back 300 miles from the El Alamein line and virtually with each mile his manpower and armored strength have dwindled under ceaseless land and air attack.

Northwest of the Volga river city, Russian troops repulsed an enemy attack and wiped out 150 nazis, the bulletin added.

ELSEWHERE, he is getting in a bad way. . . .

THE news today is overwhelmingly good—so good that it may tempt you to jump to rosy conclusions.

Before doing so, read this statement from Jan Christian Smuts, the soldier-premier of South Africa, issued today in London:

"The spectacular British-American campaign in northern Africa makes possible a great allied offensive year IN 1943, which might end the war IN 1944."

The Germans are getting a hard jolt, but they aren't licked yet. . . .

NEWS from the South Pacific today is scarce, but what there is of it is good.

MacArthur's men are still driving the Japs back in New Guinea, with hopeful indications that their retreat toward the beaches may turn into a rout.

U. S. submarines have sunk seven Jap troop and supply ships in the South Pacific, and American heavy bombers have damaged four more—presumably carrying troops and equipment to the Solomons or to New Guinea.

The fighting on Guadalcanal is reported today to be in a lull.

IT still seems a trifle odd that with so much of our fighting strength going to Africa the Japs don't hit harder than they seem to be hitting in the South Pacific.

What are they up to?

An odd body tumbling from a balcony now and then proved the accuracy of their fire.

This cowboy-and-Indian performance apparently was just what the locals had been waiting for all their lives.

While rifles cracked, family groups—including papa, mama, grandma, grandpa and all the little ones stood on the sidewalks gazing enraptured at the spectacle.

During one lull in the fighting everybody was invited into a local cafe for a glass of vin rouge (red wine)—on the house.

If the French behaved oddly, they had nothing on the Arabs. All through what seemed to me like quite a battle the Arab population wandered up and down the streets as though nothing was happening.

A gang of small fry came scampering out of enemy territory to cadge cigarettes.

A high, two-wheeled cart bearing a shabby Arab and two veiled women completely swathed in white negotiated the whole Main street behind a tired, little donkey.

Along about 4 p. m. someone came driving up through the enemy lines and stopped to ask where he could find General Ryder (Major General Charles W. Ryder).

The French had had enough, he said, and it was simply a question of finding a formula which would satisfy their honor.

Then, at 5:15 p. m., up came a car from Fort L. Emperor with a big white flag. At the same time we could hear a bugler sounding "cease fire" from inside the fort.

One French sniper in a pill box 150 yards from us was not playing that way. He let loose a long burst right over the white flag and he still was whamming away at 5:45 p. m., local time, when our fellows who had tried to blot him out with small-arms

day emergency ceiling ruling went into effect October 3.

Although butter is not a commodity which can be hoarded easily, produce dealers said consumers apparently have been ignoring the fact that the price is the highest since 1929. Large scale military and lend-lease requirements for export to Russia and elsewhere are taking a big bite out of supplies coupled with the fact that production is declining seasonally and is smaller than a year ago.

The nation's storage stocks totaled 87,037,000 pounds on November 1, compared with 188,335,000 a year ago.

Since this is the season when storage supplies built up during the summer are being withdrawn, dealers said that if only the normal rate of withdrawal occurs, storage stocks may be exhausted in January.
