Women of the Nation Urged to Save for the Government's War Bond and Stamp Program

American women, on the Pacific coast, on the east coast, 'way down south and 'round about up north, are going to hear this expression, "It's the little things that count," until they believe it and put it directly into practice. This is one of the most potent slogans chosen by the women's division of the war savings bond and stamp program, and a slogan that is timely, terse and should pack a wallop home.

Mrs. Franklin L. Weaver has accepted the Klamath county chairmanship of the women's division for savings. She has named Thursday of next week at 12 o'clock sharp as the time for a luncheon at the Pelican for all interested women and committee members in anticipation of a \$75,000 war bond and stamp goal to be gained during "Women at War Week," November 22 to 28.

Much information has reached her from national headquarters and in view of the fact that women think much alike the world over, a national appeal to the housewife and family purse string holder was not hard to achieve.

Much work is to be done by the women of Klamath county as well as women in the hundreds of other counties in these United States. If a woman isn't affected by the war one way or another, she is not considered a patriotic cog in this big national wheel which must turn of its own accord, on a well oiled

axle, and turn smoothly and rapidly.

Statistics show that women are the buyers in the nation. They buy for their homes, their children, their husbands and do practically all the gift buying around holiday time. It is in the home that the savings begins. Savings on stockings, food, electric light bills, cutting down on long distance telephone calls, entertaining on a simple scale, all these dimes, pennies, dollars and quarters, can go into a bank for the purchase of the Type E, or "family bond." It's a bargain, a \$25 bond for only \$18.75.

Numerous bits of work around the house for which she had put out a tidy sum each month, was given to her son and daughter, they in turn paid off in ten and twenty-five cent stamps.
