

Varied Program Is Presented Monday

Dramatic Reading of Play Coupled With Two-Piano Numbers Given Before Library Club

An exceptionally fine program was presented before the members of the Klamath Falls Woman's Library club on Monday afternoon at two o'clock in the library auditorium when Mrs. B. B. Blomquist of the Klamath Union high school staff and Mrs. Joseph C. O'Neill and Mrs. Samuel A. Mushen took part in a splendid performance.

Mrs. Blomquist read the play, "Power of Darkness" by Tolstol. Opening the program as well as closing it, Mrs. O'Neill and Mrs. Mushen gave two piano numbers.

Before Mrs. Blomquist opened Tolstol's book, she advised her listeners that this was a play that might shock them, might even frighten them, and there was little in the Russian's famous play which would give them delight. Her performance was magnificent, her interpretation excellent and those who had not read "Power of Darkness" did find the play an exceptionally dramatic and fearsome thing. Credit goes to Mrs. Blomquist for the manner in which she handled the characters.

The musical part of the program consisted of compositions for two pianos rendered by Mrs. O'Neill and Mrs. Mushen. Like the program these artists offered a year ago, it was most enthusiastically received. Mrs. O'Neill and Mrs. Mushen play in perfect accord; one cannot escape the marked sympathy of their interpretations. This is bound to become even greater as they continue to play together, and, if possible, was more strongly noticeable than in their previous performance.

The fact that so many of the audience afterward expressed liking for different numbers, was proof that in the variety of their selections, the performers succeeded in appealing to each listener in a special way.

The opening group of classes presented first a Bach "Sicilienne" which demonstrated that two pianos can bring out and make understandable the interwoven melodic themes of this greatest of composers, much more effectively than a solo instrument. It was clear-cut, sparkling, and altogether delightful.

The "Allegro" and "Adagio" movements of Mozart's Sonata in F Major, which followed, were the undoubted favorites of the afternoon. The "Allegro" showed Mozart in his most brilliant mood, and the insidious technical difficulties were so smoothly performed that one was scarcely aware of them. The "Adagio" was sheer melodic beauty, interpreted with great expression and sympathy.

The Beethoven "Minuet in B Flat" closed this group with marked rhythm and the noble harmonies of the great master. In lighter vein, the second group consisted of a lovely "Lullaby" by Tschalkowsky, which seemed an almost perfect interpretation; an "Andalusian Dance" by Infante, in sensuous Spanish rhythm; and two exquisite excerpts from a "Memories of Childhood" suite by Pinto.

The last group was by modern composers: "Valse Brillante" by Grun, as tantalizing and brilliant as its title implies; "Magnolias in Moonlight," a fantasy which carried one on "wings of music" to some old southern garden with its blossoming fragrance; and the final number, "The Harmonica Player," by Guion, was a crystalline picture in rhythm and tempo, of an old darkey playing for picaninies to dance. Gay and compelling, it was a splendid finale to a magnificent program.

Mrs. O'Neill and Mrs. Mushen have the satisfaction of having given a delightful afternoon to their listeners, and one which will linger as a happy memory. Realizing the many, many hours required to bring such a recital to perfection, much credit and praise are due them, together with the hope that they may be heard again in the not too distant future.

The next meeting of Library club is scheduled for Monday afternoon, December fourteenth, when Mrs. E. A. Geary and Mrs. Everett Dennis will take part in a defense program. Mrs. Geary will discuss Asia, Mrs. Dennis, India. There will be a silver tea following the program, money to be used for the purchase of a defense bond. An interesting feature of this meeting will be an exhibit of Christmas wrappings using common materials.
