

Harvest Dinner Event at Tulelake

Legionnaires and Families Gather About Bountiful Tables Armistice Evening

TULELAKE — In gratitude for another bountiful harvest in the Tulelake basin, Tulelake Legionnaires and their families with a few guests gathered Armistice eve for the annual harvest dinner in the Legion hall. Places were marked about the beautifully decorated tables for two hundred guests. The dinner for Legion families only replaces the annual public duck and goose bake that some years ago attracted hundreds of lovers of good food from all parts of the basin.

The dinner, a potluck this year, centered about the main course of waterfowl. Tiny ducks and geese rested on grass rimmed lakes for the central table note. "Blinds" perched at advantageous places and place favors were winged geese. Orange pumpkins and tapers added to the attractive arrangements.
