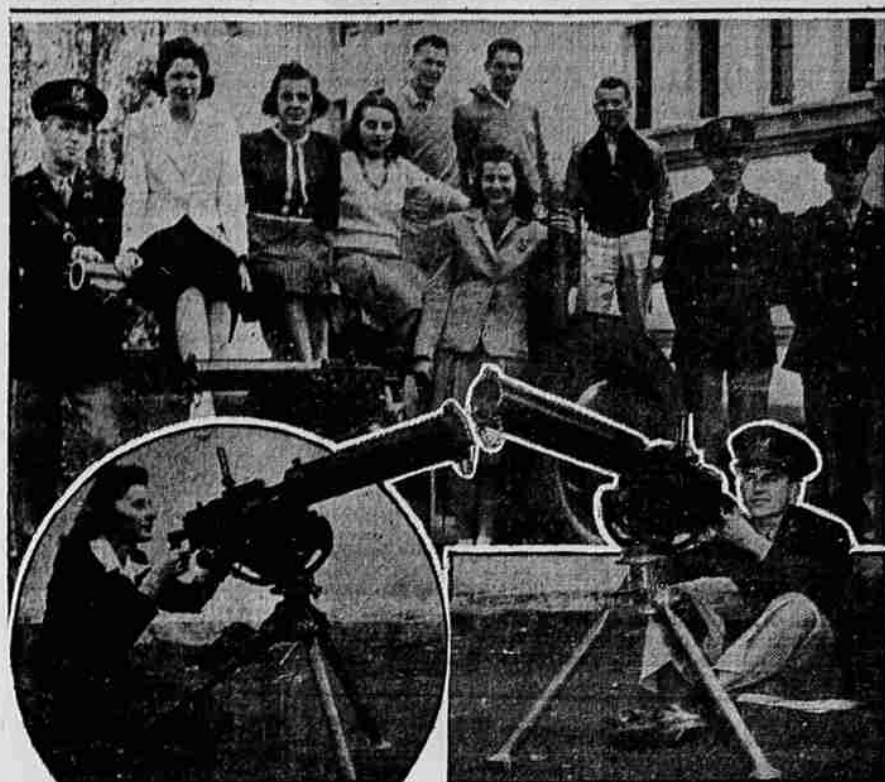

THE war in the Mediterranean is smoldering today, with flames expected to break out at any moment. Tunisia is the place to watch.

The Germans hold Bizerte and Tunis, and we have to take them.

London thinks the Germans may be throwing the first of two newly organized airborne panzer divisions into Tunisia, across the narrow Sicilian strait.

These airborne panzer divisions are supposed to contain about 7500 fighting men, 2500 service troops and more than 200 tanks each.

THE De Gaulle-Darlan ruckus, hinted at in yesterday's dispatches, flares up in the British house of commons today. Labor Member Sir Percy Harris says the deal made with Darlan in Northern Africa is a "bitter pill for those who have been loyal to France under the leadership of De Gaulle to swallow."
