

NEWELL TALKS ENLISTMENT VS. INDUCTION

NEWELL — Whether young Americans of Japanese ancestry would prefer to enlist in some branch of the United States armed forces or wait for induction was discussed at the regular meeting of the temporary council on November 10. Twenty-one of the 62 block representatives were absent but 60 young residents of military age in these various blocks voted to volunteer for military service, 31 young men were undecided, and all the other young men voted for induction by regular government procedure.

The war department has recently called for volunteers among the nisei (Japanese born in America) to enlist in the army language school at Savage, Minn. Two young men from the Newell project have already passed the difficult requirements for this branch of the service and have gone to Savage.

Editorial Asks Classification
A call for teachers of the Japanese language for the military intelligence school in Denver, Colo., brought 30 applicants. As many as can pass the rigid examination and requirements for this branch of the work will be chosen.

Because they are young Americans, young nisei are demanding to know why they are not allowed to serve in the armed forces of the United States like other young Americans. An editorial in the Tulean Dispatch—the project newspaper—of November 13, said in part:

"The recent war department plan whereby nisei with a fluent command of both the English and the Japanese are being given an opportunity to enlist in the United States armed service fails to justify the plea of the average nisei for his earnest desire to serve in any branch of the United States armed services."

Gladly Volunteer
"The average nisei, naturally, will not be able to meet these language qualifications. He is too Americanized to know anything else but the English language and good old-fashioned Americanism. As in the case with other Americans, he simply cannot help it. The chances are that those nisei with any kind of Japanese language background are not as patriotic as those without."

"The patriotic nisei, without the language barrier, would gladly volunteer for the army or any other branch of the United States armed services."

"How about a clarification on our citizenship status and then the army could take the nisei through normal channels as well as the volunteers?"

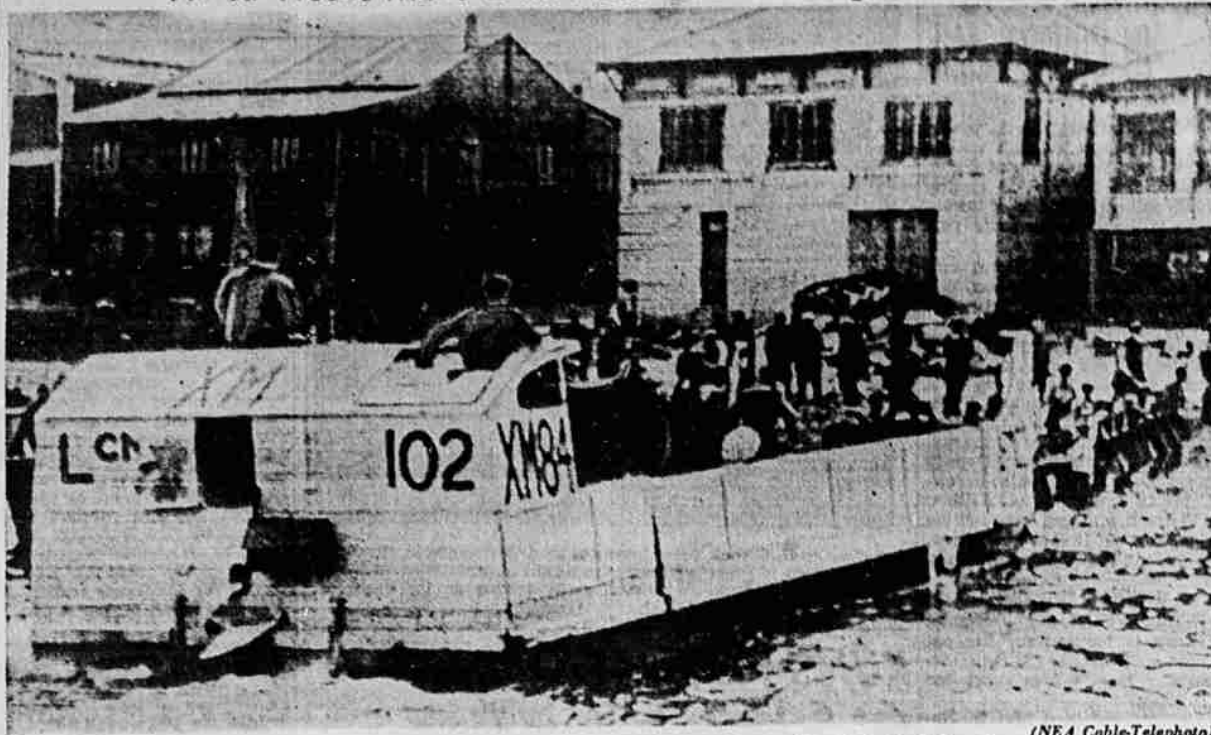
CONCRETE EVIDENCE
