MRS. ROOSEVELT ASKS SACRIFICES

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18 (AP)—Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt told reporters today that her trip to England had convinced her that if American citizens could only realize that the length of the war will depend largely on what they do "we might put a great deal more into our war effort."

Mrs. Roosevelt, whose return was announced by the White House yesterday, talked to reporters for an hour and a half. Asked for examples of what Americans could do, she said give up non-essentials for one thing. Also if women were willing to do a great deal more work, there could be relieved more manpower for war industry and the armed services.

Asked if she could sum up what she got out of her trip, she said: "I am glad I went because I learned a tremendous amount. I came back with an enormous pride in the ability of human nature to rise above the things that bother us the most—the little inconveniences. I came back with a tremendous feeling that when you have to face things you can do it."

Woman "Jumps Or Falls" To Death In New York Park

NEW YORK, Nov. 18 (AP)—Park attendants gave Mrs. Lillian Campbell a summons because her terrier, Winkle, wore neither muzzle nor leash. Mrs. Campbell pleaded with them, but had to keep the summons, which carried a maximum fine of \$2.

She tied Winkle to a tree and walked to a wall which dropped 40 feet to the railroad tracks on the other side. Track workers found her body.

McNary Denies Supreme Court Appointment Tale

PORTLAND, Nov. 18 (AP)—Sen. Charles L. McNary (R-Ore.) will not go to the U. S. supreme court bench.

Denying a rumor of his imminent appointment, McNary wrote A. B. Chittenden, Portland, "My place is here in the senate. I was a candidate in good faith and will remain here because I am in a position to do more for my country and state than I would be as a member of the court."

REPORT CONDEMNS OREGON'S PRISON

SALEM, Nov. 18 (AP)—The state board of control today ordered Warden George Alexander of the state penitentiary to appear before it next Wednesday to discuss the recent report of the Osborne foundation of New York City, which severely condemned the prison and its administration.

The Osborne report said the penitentiary "continues to function as an example of old-fashioned penology and the program may best be described as a stagnant one."

"It provides only a minimum of essentials for the improvement and redirection of the prisoners and many of the methods employed, although not overtly cruel, are anything but constructive. The administration appears satisfied to carry on in a placid tempo, undisturbed by newer trends in prison management."

A previous report by the foundation, critical of the state training school for boys at Woodburn, led to the dismissal of the superintendent of that institution.

Stockman Reports \$745 for Campaign

SALEM, Nov. 18 (AP)—Lowell Stockman, Pendleton republican who was elected to congress from the second district, spent \$745 in his general election campaign, while Harris Ellsworth, Roseburg republican, who was elected in the fourth congressional district, spent \$469, campaign expense statements filed with the state department showed today.

BATTLE OVER FOR'S TARIFF BILL LOOMS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18 (AP)—The house ways and means committee today tabled legislation to give President Roosevelt broad power to suspend immigration and tariff laws and appointed a subcommittee to work out a proposal satisfactory to the administration and to congress.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18 (AP)—President Roosevelt's request for broad wartime power to suspend tariff and immigration regulations developed today into a potential major battle for the dying days of the 77th congress and the administration's first test of strength since the November 3 elections.

A determined republican drive to block consideration of the measure this year gathered headway as the house ways and means committee called several top-ranking government officials to discuss the need for such legislation.

At FDR's Request
Among those asked to appear were War Production Chief Donald Nelson, Attorney General

Francis Biddle, Undersecretary of War Robert P. Patterson, Assistant Secretary of the Navy James V. Forrestal, Rear Admiral Emory S. Land, chairman of the war shipping administration, and Milo Perkins, chairman of the board of economic warfare.

The bill, designed "to facilitate, to the extent required for the effective prosecution of the war, the free movement of persons, property and information into and out of the United States," was introduced by Chairman Doughton (D-N.C.) at the president's request.

Step to Totalitarianism
Specifically, it would give the chief executive the authority to suspend "in whole or in part, those laws or regulations" which in his opinion interfere with the war effort of imposing tariffs and taxes on imports and exports, and those regulating the entrance and departure of individuals.

But, even as the committee called its executive session, opponents raised a protest that the measure would go much further than that it constituted a step toward totalitarianism, that it would break down the tariff and immigration laws.

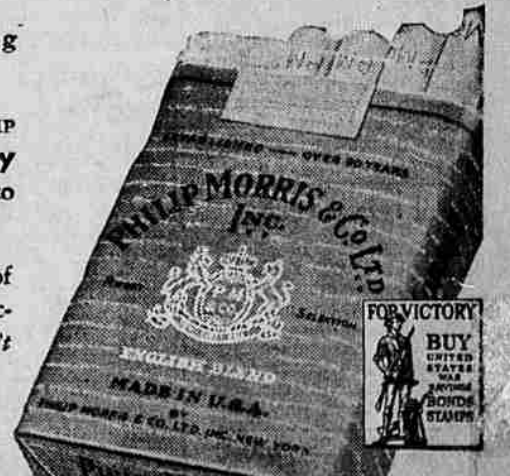
