

TOKYO TELLS SINKING OF BATTLESHIP

(Continued From Page One) cruisers, four or five destroyers and a transport.

Wires Crossed
The Japanese also declared they had heavily damaged two battleships, three cruisers, three or four destroyers and three transports.

Curiously, the Tokyo radio claimed that "terrible damage" had been inflicted on the U. S. battleship Idaho, thereby betraying crossed wires in axis propaganda. On October 6, without any confirmation then or since, the Italians reported the sinking of the Idaho 330 miles off West Africa.

"Our Choosing"
As a prelude to the Japanese communique, the Tokyo radio declared imperial headquarters would tell the world that "the Japanese naval victory was so overwhelming that U. S. attempts at a counter-offensive in the South Pacific are a thing of the past."

By contrast, informed quarters at Pearl Harbor, headquarters of the U. S. Pacific fleet, pointed to Admiral Chester W. Nimitz' significant comment that future action in the South Seas theater "may be of our own choosing, not their choosing."

60,000 Japs Dead
Observers also cited President Roosevelt's statement last night that a fortnight's "good news" from the battle zones indicated that the turning-point of the war had been reached—in favor of the United Nations.

Upwards of 60,000 Japanese already have been killed since the attack on Pearl Harbor, a survey disclosed, including 5000 in the battle of the Coral sea, more than 10,000 at Midway, between 20,000 and 40,000 in the latest sea battle of Guadalcanal, and more than 5000 on Guadalcanal.

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that axis troops were well established and ready to meet the allied offensive.

"Following the occupation of Bizerte, the initiative now is in the hands of the Germans and Italians in Tunisia," a Nazi broadcast said.

Reports of intensified British submarine activities indicated that Hitler was desperately seeking to rush sea-borne reinforcements across the Mediterranean to the dark continent, as well as concentrating great numbers of planes for a showdown battle.

Conflicting Reports
But the axis claw that only a few months ago threatened to squeeze the entire Middle East was now steadily withdrawing its burnt fingers.

Conflicting reports variously pictured the French in Tunisia as aiding both the allies and the axis, some responding to Hotter's appeal for help while others accepted Admiral Jean Darlan's invitation to fight on the side of the United Nations.

A broadcast from the radio in American-occupied Algiers said French patrols clashed repeatedly with German reconnaissance forces operating out of Bizerte, five Tunisian naval base, and drove the nazis back in one skirmish.

Meanwhile, a dispatch from Monrovia, Liberia, suggested that the strategic naval base at Dakar, French West Africa, might fall to the allies through negotiations. It quoted a Vichy broadcast as reporting that a military mission from Dakar was on its way to allied-occupied North Africa. Allied headquarters in London, however, had no confirmation on the report.

the nazis had in Egypt escaped destruction or capture.

Referring to Rommel, he says: "He will hang on (to the bitter end). He always does. He's a good fighter, that fellow. He's trying to reorganize."

IN Spain, Franco moves to increase his army. He now has 500,000 men, and may double or triple that number.

NIPPONS CONTINUE RETREAT TO BUNA

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New Guinea, a formation of 18 bombers and fighters attacked advanced allied ground units Monday in the Buna area and sank two trawlers along the coast.

But the emperor's airmen got better than they gave as American Z-25 medium bombers, P-40 fighters and attack planes twice swept over the enemy air field at Lae, northwest along the coast from Buna and destroyed seven bombers and seven fighters on the ground and one Zero that attempted interception.

Heavy bombers of the Southwest Pacific command again carried the attack to Japanese bases in the Solomons theater, setting fire to a large merchantman at Rabaul, New Britain, and destroying three enemy aircraft on an airfield runway in the Buin-Faisi area of the Northern Solomons.

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had been instructed to reclassify all registrants heretofore deferred because of convictions of crimes.

No more deferments are to be made on the ground unless the registrants "are completely disqualified morally and are not eligible for a waiver under the new army standards," the boards were told.

Physicists Shortage

The army has authorized waivers in "especially meritorious cases" even for men who have served terms for treason, murder, rape, kidnaping, arson and other "heinous crimes" if their conduct has been fitting for at least six months after their release from confinement.

In another draft development, a critical shortage of physicists has been recognized by the war manpower commission and selective service, and the latter agency disclosed today new procedure for obtaining draft deferment for persons in that field. A national committee has been set up with authority to investigate physicists whose deferment has been requested by a college or other employer on the ground that he has special training and skill and is a necessary man in his work.

Similar Procedure

If the committee agrees the man is necessary, it will endorse the application for his deferment and return it to the man's local board. The committee may appear if the local board nevertheless classifies the man as available for military service or for "assignment to work of national importance."

Selective service said similar procedure would be followed in other scientific and specialized fields where critical shortages develop, and national committees will be set up in those fields.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 18 (P)—Expressing a willingness to "die as an American citizen on the field of battle," Minoru Yasui, 26, American-born Japanese lawyer was sentenced to a year in a road camp and fined \$5000 for violating the enemy alien curfew law.

Yasui, who was found by Federal Judge James A. Fee to be an alien by election despite his American birth, violated the curfew law with intention to test its legality, he insisted. His attorney, John R. Collier, indicated that he would appeal Judge Fee's findings that Yasui is an alien.

Allies Acquire Shipping in Africa

LONDON, Nov. 18 (AP)—The ministry of economic warfare announced today that the allies had acquired between 200,000 and 300,000 tons of merchant shipping as a result of their entry into North Africa.

It said about 120,000 tons of shipping was laid up in North and West African ports, and estimated that at least a third of the tonnage which normally operates between France and North Africa—another 120,000 tons—also would be taken over by the allies.

Spain now has an army of about 500,000 and it may be doubled or tripled under the partial mobilization order and it is doubtful that El Caudillo will try to realize full military potential quickly.

The experience gained by Spaniards in their own fierce civil war adds much to their likely fighting effectiveness, but also adds an element of doubt as to how enthusiastically they would fight against one or the other of the present warring camps. It is generally agreed that a majority would be ready to fight against an invasion.
