Battered and Torn, U. S. Cruiser "Boise" Is Back From Solomons Battle Zone

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19 (AP)—Battered and torn by many Japanese shells and once given up for lost, the American light cruiser Boise came home from the Solomon Islands battle zone today with the extraordinary record of having been chiefly instrumental in sinking six Japanese warships in a single engagement.

The 10,000-ton vessel, classed as a light cruiser because she bears only six-inch guns, docked at the Philadelphia navy yard where her skipper, Captain E. J. (Mike) Moran of San Francisco, was greeted by Admiral Ernest J. King, commander-in-chief of the United States fleet. King had made a special trip from Washington to welcome the hero vessel and its crew.

The Boise lost three officers and 104 men killed in the violent night battle which occurred off Cape Esperance, Guadalcanal, on October 11-12 when a cruiser-destroyer task force intercepted a Japanese cruiser-destroyer-transport force bearing troops to the southeastern Solomons Islands.

The Boise was lead ship of the American group and bore the brunt of the fighting in which the Japanese lost two heavy cruisers, one light cruiser and three destroyers.

In the course of the battling, the American vessel received many hits, including what the navy called eleven "straddles" and one blow from an eight-inch shell which pierced her hull nine feet below the water line.

Well out in front of her accompanying vessels the Boise took brutal punishment from the eight-inch armament of the enemy's heavy cruisers.

Flames that leaped mast high enveloped her and roared deep in her hull. The other vessels in the American flotilla gave her up for lost and continued on their course.

You'll find other smaller cosmetic luggage packed with preparations carrying such names as DuBarry, Tussy, Harriet Hubbard Ayer, as well as Rubinstein and Coty . . . Many of them are small, about the size of a handbag, and have room for just the cosmetics . . . Cleansing cream, astringent, night cream, powder, rouge, lipstick and other items you like to take with you.

"Cosmetic luggage" is a wonderful Christmas present . . . My hints didn't do any good last year, but I'm still hoping . . . But I hope he gets busy right away, because Currin's expects to sell most of these long before the usual Christmas-rush time.

NAZIS SAID TO HAVE ARRESTED GEN. WEYGAND

LONDON, Nov. 19 (AP)—General Maxime Weygand was reported by a fighting French source tonight to have been arrested by the gestapo after the Nazi march into erstwhile unoccupied France but to have been freed 24 hours later.

The informant was Leon Morandat, prominent French trade unionist who joined the De Gaulleists here after witnessing the German crossing of the former demarcation line.

(A Rome broadcast, reported by the United States federal communications commission, said "It is officially confirmed that General Weygand is under arrest in Germany." There was no confirmation of this report, which was included in an Italian domestic broadcast.)

Declined Offer—Morandat's arrival in London with General D'Astier de la Vigerie, formerly one of the top air commanders in the French army, was announced last night. Morandat said Weygand had declined an offer by Marshal Petain to name him commander of the French army.

Morandat said he was in Lyons on the first day of the German occupation and that the French showed their attitude by giving the occupation columns wrong road directions.

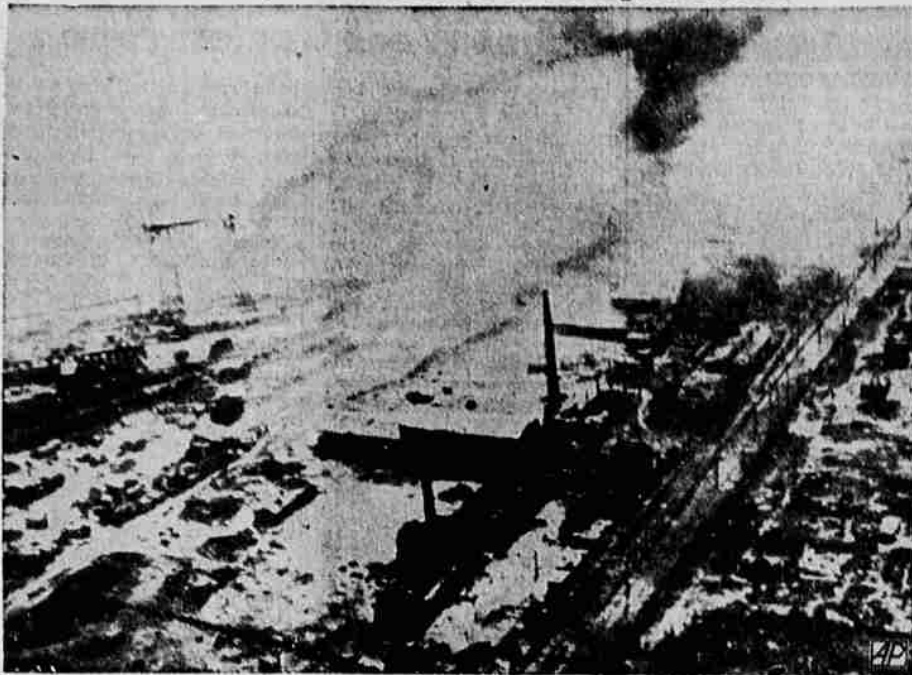

FORMER CHIEF JUSTICE RAND DIES IN SALEM

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 19 (AP)—John Langdon Rand, 81, former chief justice of the Oregon state supreme court and an associate justice since October, 1921, died this morning in a hospital at Salem.

He became ill Tuesday, suffering a heart attack.

Judge Rand was a native of Portsmouth, N. H. He attended Smith's Preparatory school at Portsmouth and graduated from Dartmouth in 1883. He came to Walla Walla the same year to teach at Whitman where he also studied law and was admitted to the bar in 1885. In July of that year he came to Oregon and was admitted to the Oregon bar in May, 1886.

In Legislature

He was elected district attorney of the 6th judicial district in eastern Oregon in 1888. He made his home in Baker where he served as a member of the school board and also as city attorney.

He represented Baker, Malheur and Harney counties in the

state legislature in 1903 and 1905.

He married Edith G. Packwood, who survives him, on July 23, 1895. Mrs. Rand's parents were pioneers of Baker county. Judge Rand was name associate justice of the state supreme court by Governor Ben Olcott in October, 1921.
