CASCADE SUMMIT HAS SOME SNOW

CASCADE SUMMIT— "Unusual" is the adjective used to describe the weather here. About 38 inches of snow has fallen. A steady downpour of rain Saturday turned into a howling blizzard early in the evening. Wire communication was disrupted for several hours. Several large trees were blown across the signal wires with minor delays to trains.

This is the first time since the construction of the railroad in 1926 that the Jordan spreader has been used to remove snow from the tracks. Oil burners are used to keep the switches free from snow.
