BOSTON WOOL

BOSTON, Nov. 20 (AP-USA)—Class three, 12-months Texas wools were sold in the Boston wool market today at a clean price of \$1.18. Ohio graded wools were sold at grease prices, delivered mill, of 54 cents for three-eighths and quarter-blood, 51 cents for half-blood and 50 cents for medium clothing wools. Mohair was bought in Texas at prices of 46 cents for adult and 56 cents for kid.

Shop Building Collapses in High Wind at Dorris

DORRIS—A high wind the night of November 13, caused a partially-completed shop building on the grounds of Butte Valley high school at Dorris to collapse, but an inspection by school officials showed the structure had not been irreparably damaged. Shop class students were ready to resume construction as soon as weather permitted.

Sides and ends of the new building had been built on the ground, sheeted and covered with tarpaper, then raised and

braced temporarily without joining. The storm caused the south end to fall inward onto the floor, while the east side fell against a large pile of scrap metal and the west side sagged inward. North end of the structure remained standing.
