NEW YORK — Paul Governali, Columbia's ace passer, completes his collegiate career Saturday against Dartmouth, the same team against which he made his start as a regular three seasons ago.

Oregon Favored to Win Civil War Tilt

Beavers Meet Webfeet on Home Field In Traditional Football Classic

Staggering down the home stretch of football guessing, the Associated Press sports writers pick Oregon to defeat Oregon State in their annual grid civil war this year held on Bell field in Corvallis tomorrow.

Though the Oregon-Oregon State clash is steeped in tradition like the Stanford-California battle at Berkeley, neither game has any bearing on the conference title race or bowl games.

Two old football rivalries share the limelight in the far west's grid contests Saturday. One is the 50-year-old struggle between Stanford and California, the other the two Rose bowl contenders, Washington and the UCLA Bruins.

After two weeks' rest caused by an open date last weekend, the UCLA Bruins are strong favorites to ship the twice beaten

Huskies and remain in the bowl running despite the Oregon upset two weeks past.

Klamath Set for Tough Battle With Vancouver

Weather Hampers Pelican Practice Sessions; Trappers Have Light Line

"This game will be won or lost in the last two quarters," prophesied Pelican Coach Frank Ramsey Friday morning as his team readied itself for battle tonight with the Vancouver Trappers on Modoc field at 8 o'clock.

"We're meeting a team with an enviable record," Ramsey said. "In the past four years—34 games—they have won 31, lost two, tied one. And they have never lost a late season game. I think the team that gets the breaks—or makes the breaks—will win."

At Trapper headquarters, Dutch Shields, wiry master of the Vancouver destiny, was goose shooting Friday morning, promising to bring back his shotgun for use in the game if the going gets too rough.

It was expected that the Trappers, who arrived Thursday night by train, will have a practice advantage over the Pelicans who have been hampered by a snowy field thus holding up practice sessions.

Both teams should approach the night game on equal terms. The Trappers have a decided disadvantage from a light line and high altitude short wind, and the Pelicans at an equal disadvantage because of lack of practice in the past week.

The Pelican starting line-up was announced the same as used in the Bend game, with Mast, Selby, Vallancour, and Foster in the backfield, and Coddington, Patzke, Clement, Blohm, Watson, Yancey and Mayfield in the line. Don Mast, 168-pound fullback, will act as captain for the struggle.

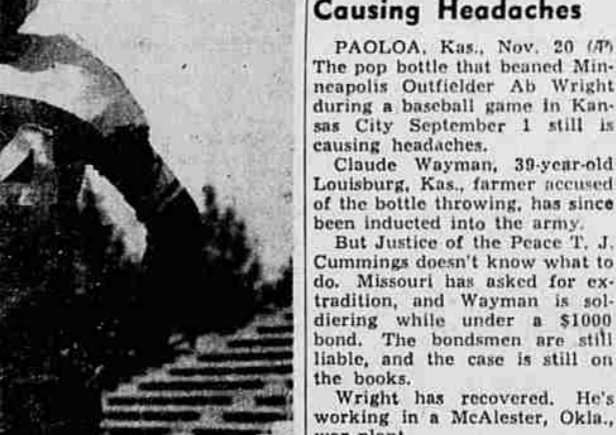
Allinger, Jacobsen, Grant and Hoff were announced as the starting backfield for the Trappers. The line was set as DeLong, Officer, Gomulkiwicz, Flock, Ripley, Neely and Butcher. Captain was not announced, but it was expected that Hoff or Allinger will fill the post.

Modoc field was clear of early week snow today, and 38 bales of peate moss were scattered and rolled into the turf to soak up the remaining moisture and make the frozen ground a bit softer for the tumbling players. The student bleachers on the east side of the field have been cleared of snow.
