

RAIN-SWOLLEN STREAMS FLOOD WEST OREGON

PORTLAND, Nov. 24 (AP)—Rain-swollen western Oregon streams flooded lowlands yesterday, isolating homes and damaging bridges and buildings. One man was feared drowned.

The Sandy river washed out a bridge at Brightwood and carried away the home of George W. Scott. Waves broke up the house and after pts of neighbors to rescue Scott were unavailing. Minor property damage was reported around Portland as Johnson and Kellogg creeks overflowed.

The weather bureau said tributaries of the Willamette river would break their banks. At Jefferson the Willamette overflowed, but flooding was not expected in the lower river.

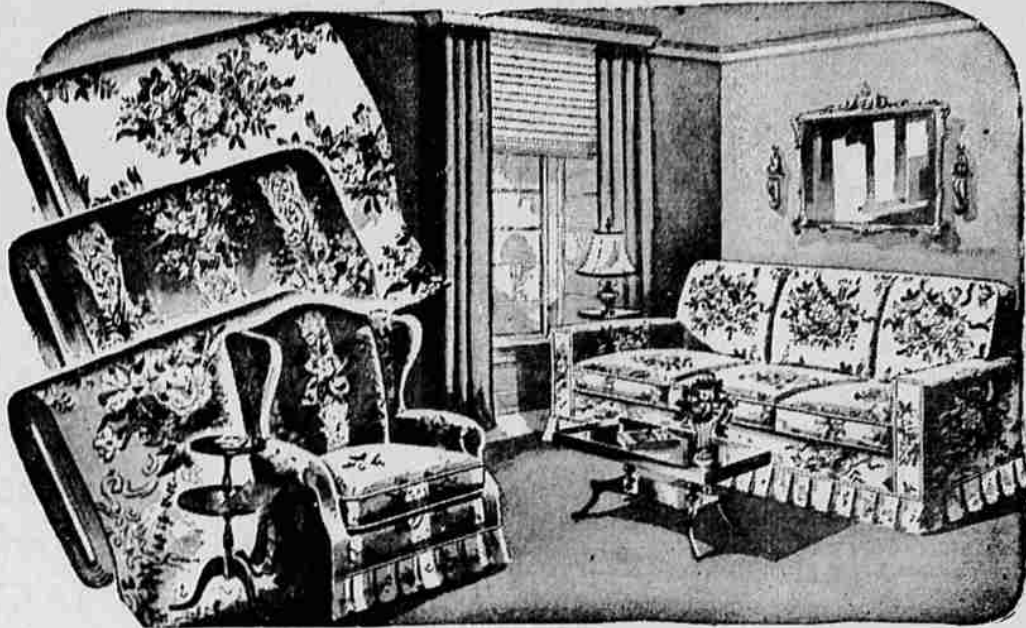
Returns—Geraldine Knuth has returned from a week's vacation spent in Eugene. She is employed as stenographer at the First National bank.

BRITISHER RAPS LEND-LEASE PLAN

LONDON, Nov. 24 (AP)—Sir Patrick Hannon, sauce manufacturer, member of parliament and persistent critic of some phases of the lend-lease program, declared today that it "has struck a major blow, at least for the time being, at a wide range of British enterprise."

Earlier in his presidential address to the National Union of Manufacturers, he acknowledged the "immense contribution to the war effort" of lend-lease, but said that a disturbing feature of the new relationship between government and business was "an almost crushing embargo" placed on exports.

He added that "it might have been possible to continue in substantial proportion British exports to our dominions and colonial empire without consultation with United States authorities whether a particular article should or should not be included in the category of permissible exports."



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
