

## LOCAL VIEWS PRESENTED TO CONGRESSMAN

After hearing local expressions on many subjects, Congressman-elect Lowell Stockman left Tuesday night for Lakeview, continuing his swing over the big second congressional district in advance of taking over the duties of his new office from Congressman Walter M. Pierce.

At an informal luncheon at noon Tuesday, Stockman heard the views of about 20 local citizens, ranging from opposition to excessive and unnecessary government expenditures to dissatisfaction with daylight saving time.

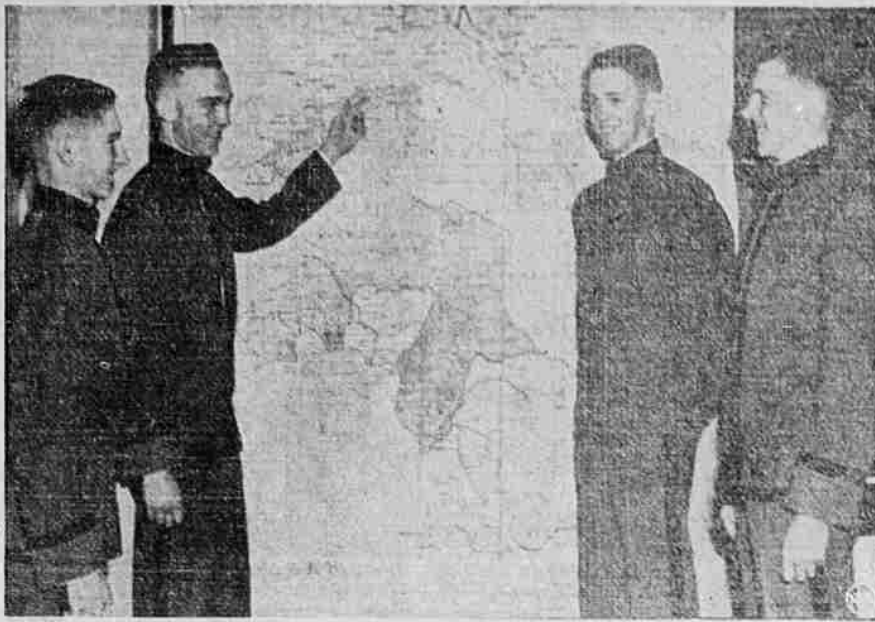
Farmers stated that the daylight savings program complicates the day on the farm, and is entirely impractical. They said that children are being picked up in black morning darkness to leave for school. Because war industries are generally working around the clock, they expressed doubt that the present time schedule is of any general value.

Stockman stated that the first objective of the nation must be to win the war and he said he will devote his every effort in that direction. He said that congress' duty in the war program for the time being is largely in voting the proper and necessary funds for vigorous prosecution of the war, leaving the strategy to the military. After the war, however, issues of the utmost importance will be before congress, he said.

State Senator Marshall Cornett presided at the luncheon meeting. After the meeting, Stockman conferred with the county court and other citizens on road matters, and in the afternoon talked with timbermen about forestry questions and to farmers. He discussed with A. M. Thomas, the superintendent of the Enterprise Irrigation district, the pending question of federal or state control of the waters of streams which cross state lines.

Stockman again expressed his appreciation to Klamath voters for their support in the recent election, and said he would keep the interests of this county constantly before him.

## FDR QUIETS PRODUCTION CHIEF CLASH

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25 (AP)—Arguments among some government officials over who bosses the nation's war production were stilled at least temporarily today by President Roosevelt's assertion there is no individual high command.

Present administrators, the president told a press conference yesterday, must work together to solve the problems of production, allocation of materials and scheduling of production.

Further, he declared, all the officials concerned with these problems are supposed to agree. And if they don't Mr. Roosevelt added, he will put them in a room and tell them to do so.

Comment on current conflicting reports over who has the final word on production and allocations, the president observed that those who say there will be a single man control over all war production factors are doodle drawing.

**Clash Expected**  
Government sources have predicted that War Production Chief Donald M. Nelson's appointment of his vice chairman, Charles E. Wilson, as top man over aircraft production might lead to a showdown conflict between WPB and military services over control of munitions production.

As matters were going, they said, the clash might be expected to determine whether Nelson or military authorities would have the final word on war economy.

## House Gets Bill On Indians' Land

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25 (AP)—The period of trust by the United States on lands allotted to Indians of the Klamath River reservation in California would be reimposed and extended to 1944 by a bill passed by the senate today and sent to the house.

The measure also provides further extension of the trust period may be made by the president.

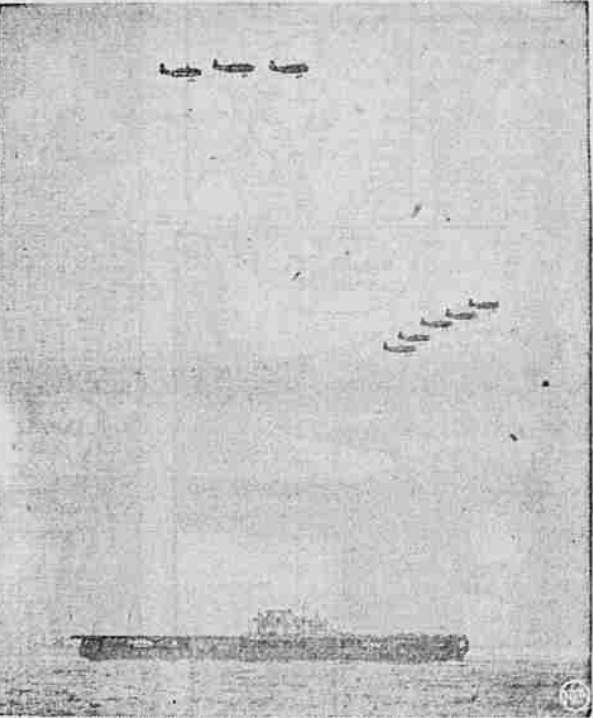

### Silverton Is Getting Along On No Water

**SILVERTON, Nov. 25 (AP)**—Silverton's water supply disappeared last night when all of the town's water reserves leaked through a hole in the dam at the city's water source at the headquarters of the Abiqua river, 25 miles from here.

The damage to the dam was caused by highway water and debris. The city's reservoir was drained a few days ago so it could be cleaned.

Silverton's schools and the cannery were closed today, and all residents were asked to use as little water as possible.

An emergency well was tapped today to supply fire protection and to care for the minimum needs of civilians.

Officials said they hoped to have the damage repaired in two or three days.

### No Decision Yet On Marshal's Post

### WHEAT

**CHICAGO, Nov. 25 (AP)**—A revival of flour business today touched off enough buying in the grain futures pits to lift wheat prices almost a cent while rye was up almost 2 cents to best levels of the month.

Substantial flour sales were reported in some localities and on the whole business was believed by grain traders to have been the best in almost two months. Some rye flour sales also were reported but traders attributed the bulk of buying in that pit to short covering prior to the holiday.

Wheat closed 1-1/2c higher than yesterday, December \$1.25 1/2, May \$1.29 1/2; corn unchanged to 1/4c up, December 83 1/2c, May 88 1/2c; oats unchanged to 1/4c up; rye 11 1/2c higher; soybeans 1/4c off to 1/4c up.
