First Survivor of Lost Flat-Top Arrives Home

SEATTLE, Nov. 27 (AP)—A vivid description of the events leading up to the sinking of the unidentified United States aircraft carrier lost last month in the Solomon Islands sea battle has been told by the first survivor to return here.

The survivor, Commander Edward Patrick Crehan, said the first torpedo "ripped right through the engine room and flooded us out. Topside, things were pretty hot. The Japs kept coming in waves, strafing and letting go with torpedoes. The day went by pretty fast. A day like that keeps a man busy."

In the late afternoon, the commander recounted, two more torpedoes struck the carrier. "One of them exploded 20 feet from where I was working. That's where I came up with this bandaged hand."

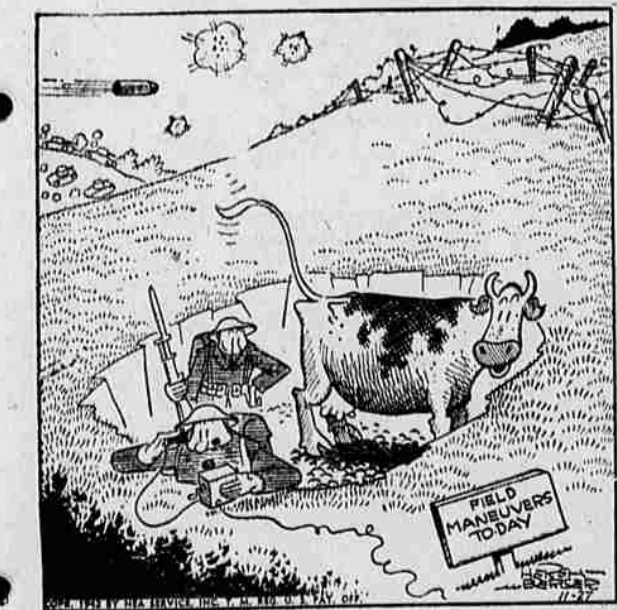
"Concussion blew me clear across the deck. Those two hits just about finished the ship. Orders to abandon her came shortly afterward."

The navy department announced the sinking of the carrier early this month but did not disclose its identity.

Hard Road Ahead, Says Stimson, Reviewing War Action on All Fronts

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27 (AP)—Reviewing allied offensives on fronts around the world, Secretary of War Stimson today said the Russian counter-attack against German siege forces was "particularly remarkable" with every indication that the Germans had suffered a major reverse.

In North Africa, the secretary told his press conference, British-American and French forces in Tunisia were gathering their strength for a final smash at strongly held axis positions, while Field Marshal Erwin Rommel's fleeing Afrika Korps was expected to make a determined stand at El Aghelia in Libya.

Solomons Situation
The Australian and American troops under General Douglas MacArthur have "cornered" a considerable number of Japanese in a pocket on the northern coast of New Guinea, Stimson said, and the feat of MacArthur's troops in fighting their way through the dense jungles was "one of the outstanding operations of the war."

The situation in the Solomon Islands, Stimson said, had been altered considerably by Admiral Halsey's "remarkable victory," but a considerable struggle was ahead before the Japs were driven off Guadalcanal. And in all probability the Japs would strike again in the Solomons area.

Winter weather has interfered to a large degree with operations in the Aleutians, he said, but America's fliers "are taking advantage of every good day to make the Japs at Kiska as uncomfortable as possible."

Stimson said the Germans were believed to have between 12,000 and 15,000 troops occupying a strip 30 to 35 miles along the gulf of Tunis, including the cities of Bizerte, Tunis, Sfax, and Gabes, all of which have excellent airports.

The mountainous terrain of Tunisia, the secretary commented, is favorable for defense, but the allied command is now building up an assault force.

This final assault, the secretary said, involves the organization of large scale movements of men and supplies for several hundred miles from Algeria, and these efforts are subject to frequent aerial attack by the axis from Sicily and Sardinia. In addition to usual bombing, he said, axis planes have been dropping thousands of pyramidal spikes designed to puncture the tires of airplanes and motor vehicles, and also have been scattering so-called booby bombs—such as wallets, watches, notebooks and clocks, which explode when they are picked up.

The French Fleet

From Vichy announcements and information obtained from well-informed quarters in London it appeared today that this is the disposition of the French fleet.

At Toulon, reported all scuttled:

Three battleships—the 26,000-ton Dunkerque and Strasbourg and the 22,000-ton Provence.

Four heavy cruisers, Foch, Colbert, Algerie and Duplex, of about 10,000 tons each, and three light cruisers, La Galissonniere, Jean De Vienne and Marceau, of 7600 tons each.

France's only seaplane tender, the Commandant Teste, 25 destroyers, 26 submarines.

A total of 62 warships not counting sloops and auxiliaries. Sunk or put out of action at Casablanca and Oran during allied landings:

One battleship, Jean Bart, 35,000 tons, beached.

Light 7240-ton cruiser Primauguet, beached.

Four destroyers disabled.

Three submarines sunk.

One submarine damaged.

At Dakar, where military authorities are now cooperating with Admiral Darlan:

One battleship, Richelieu, 35,000 tons damaged in 1940.

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NAVY'S TOLL HITS 17,252 SINCE DEC. 7

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27 (AP)—The navy's losses in killed, wounded or missing since Pearl Harbor totals 17,252 officers and men.

Up to November 15, the navy department reported last night, the navy, marine corps and coast guard casualties mounted to 4929 dead, 2157 wounded and 10,166 missing as a result of war operations in all parts of the world.

The total was disclosed with the release of casualty list No. 17 containing, for local publication, the names of 747 dead, wounded and missing reported to next of kin from November 1 through November 15. The list included 304 dead, 252 wounded and 191 missing.

Another Thanksgiving day baby arrived at Hillside hospital when a 5 pounds 10 1/2 ounce son was born to Mr. and Mrs. L. Burton Dawson, route 1, box 860. Dawson is a farmer.
