

First Program of Series December 8

Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo to Present Three Delightful Numbers on Pelican Stage

Tuesday, December the eighth, at eight o'clock in the evening and at the Pelican theatre is the time and place for one of the most thrilling performances to come to Klamath Falls and one for which members of the Klamath Community Concert association have long worked for, hoped for and awaited. It is the presentation of the Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo.

Three ballets will be given and as promised last week, here is a brief description of each:

First there will be the lovely and beautiful "The Snow Maiden," a ballet in one act based on a Russian folk legend, the choreography by Bronislava Nijinska with music by Alexander Glazounov. Those who have seen "The Snow Maiden" are more than enthusiastic in their praise of the beauty and sheer artistry of dancers, costumes and scenery. The "Snow Maiden" is charming Nathalie Krassovska.

Next comes the opulent "Scheherazade," a choreographic drama in one act by Leon Bakst and the ballet which took San Francisco and Portland by storm last year. Music lovers will recognize Rimsky-Korsakoff's lovely melodies in the music especially written for "Scheherazade." The costumes in this ballet are extravagantly done and quite on the elegant side. Choreography by Michel Fokine.

Third of the ballets is "Gaité Parisienne," another one act ballet, with music by Jacques Offenbach and choreography by Leonide Massine, an artist in his own right. This is the saucy and sparkling French sister of "Le Beau Danube" and had its first performance at the Theatre de Monte Carlo in the spring of 1938. The ballet is concerned with the immense gusto of living in and for the moment, finding its supreme expression in the Offenbach can-can.

Alexandra Danilova, whose name is familiar to followers of the ballet, is the little glove-seller and one of the highlights of this ballet is the group of can-can dancers in their gay little skirts and bold bonnets.

Conductor throughout the evening will be Franz Allers.

There are no reserved seats at the Pelican for this performance, the policy observed in past programs of the concert association, and those who have favorite sections in the theatre will have to come early. The house will probably rival that seen when Paul Robson sang here to an enthusiastic audience.

Residents of the city who arrived here after the membership campaign closed in the spring, may be able to obtain tickets by calling the association secretary, Mrs. Claude H. Davis. There are a number of tickets available, left by those who have moved from the city in the past six months. No admissions will be sold at the door.
