CHINA'S FIRST LADY IN AMERICA

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28 (P) — Madame Chiang Kai-shek, famed first lady of China's fighting millions, is back today in America—the land of her school days.

This time it was the after-effects of an accident on one of her daring trips to the Sino-Japanese battlefield that brought the wife of China's generalissimo to the United States. When or how she arrived was not disclosed.

But there was immediate speculation that her trip might also spell new anti-Japanese strategy as well as cement more firmly the fighting efforts of the two allied nations.

A White House announcement said yesterday the woman who helped weld China's warring factions into a mighty military unit was here for treatment of injuries sustained five years ago when a tire blew out on the automobile in which she was riding—under heavy Japanese fire—while visiting the front.

After treatments are concluded, she will visit President and Mrs. Roosevelt, the announcement said.

Fifth of Nazi Air Force in Russia Moved to Africa

LONDON, Nov. 28 (P) — Nearly a fifth of the whole German air force that was facing the Russians before the outbreak of American and British operations in French North Africa has been moved to face the new threat, Sir Archibald Sinclair, British air minister, declared Friday.

"In addition to the Italian air force we are engaging in the home and African waters more than half the German air force," he added.

RUMOR SETS OFF RUN ON GAS STATIONS

DENVER, Nov. 28 (P) — A rumor caused cash registers in Denver filling stations to sing a pre-war song of prosperity. But gasoline supplies and attendants—to say nothing of automobiles—took a terrific beating.

It started late yesterday. Automobiles suddenly steamed into the stations, startled attendants heard the old familiar "fill-erup" so many times that they soon became swamped. Long lines of cars formed behind the pumps.

Just Like Coffee

Some of the cars contained cans of various sizes, pails, jugs and other containers which the owners insisted must be filled with gasoline. A few drivers urged attendants to pour gas into milk bottles.

All the drivers told a similar story. They said excitedly: "They're freezing gas at midnight. Just like coffee. We won't be able to get any more until rationing starts Tuesday."

Rumor Denied

Station operators, their gasoline stocks disappearing, questioned some of the motorists. The reply was usually something like this: "Why Joe told me. He heard it from Charley. Don't know where Charley got his dope."

Federal authorities said they had no idea where the rumor started, or how it spread so rapidly. Stanley C. Brandenburg, Colorado ration chief, was quick to announce, however, that: "The report is entirely erroneous and without foundation."

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 28 (P) — Portland motorists thronged service stations last night as a rumor spread over the west that gasoline stocks would be frozen at midnight.

Most Portland stations closed at 7 p. m. and motorists besieged taxicab garages thereafter, pleading for a gallon or two of gasoline.

Ration officials here, as elsewhere, said the rumor was erroneous.

Japs Change Their Story On Third Battle of Isles

NEW YORK, Nov. 28 (P) — The Japanese changed their story today on the third battle of the Solomons, adding only confusion.

This was the mid-November sea battle in which the enemy apparently threw in all his sea strength available to reinforce Guadalcanal and suffered a loss of 28 ships ink—including Japan's first admitted battleship—in the greatest naval battle since Jutland.

As broadcast by the Berlin radio, the latest paper broadside of Tokyo sank one United States battleship and three cruisers not reported before and said another battleship was so crippled her loss also was a certainty.

This had no confirmation from any source.

WLB REFUSES TO REVIEW PLYWOOD PAY

PORTLAND, Nov. 28 (P) — Wage increases for employees of 18 Oregon and Washington plywood mills will be retroactive to February 15, 1942.

This was announced by B. H. Kizer, chairman of the west coast lumber commission, upon learning yesterday that the war labor board had refused to review the case, which had been appealed by employers.

Dec. 1 Deadline

The increases were granted May 16, and the AFL asked that they be made retroactive to January 1. Employers asked a date not earlier than April 1. The commission decided on February 15.

Kizer also said the back pay must be given employees by December 1.

Vacations

Other commission actions: The deadline for vacations in Willamette valley lumber operations was extended to January 15, 1943. October had been the last vacation month. In lieu of vacations, however, workers may take a week's pay.

A wage increase for CIO employees of the St. Paul and Tacoma Lumber company in Tacoma will be retroactive to April 1. The union has asked January 1 as the date. The company also was ordered to increase pay 25 per cent for night work, retroactive to April 1.

GUADALCANAL, Solomon Islands, Nov. 7 (Delayed) — If you think playing tag with an 18-foot Japanese torpedo is fun, ask young Richard McCallister, of Leipsic, O., first class private in the marines. He tried it today.

McCallister was calmly swimming around in the ocean, a few feet off the beach at Lunga point. As he swam, he watched a small cargo vessel being unloaded.

Suddenly, just beyond the cargo vessel a periscope broke water. Then the fun began!

"I realized it was a sub," McCallister said, "and I thought for a second it was one of ours. Then I saw a white streak coming my way, and I didn't have to have anybody tell me it was a torpedo."

"I saw the son-of-a-gun curving just off the stern of the ship. Then it started coming right toward me."

"I began to swim for shore like Johnny Weismuller, but the 'fish' passed me like I was standing still. It was about three feet from me when it went by."

"When I hit the beach, I made Jesse Owen (one-time college sprint star) look like an amateur. I sure thought that thing was going off."

The torpedo beached itself harmlessly in front of the naval operating base. Our destroyers, and aircraft went out after that sub in a hurry. I don't know whether they got it, but they certainly filled that area of the ocean with depth charges and bombs.
