

WOMAN KILLED IN COLLISION NEAR WILLOWS

MALIN—A two-deck Henzel brothers truck, loaded with hogs, was overturned near Willows, Calif., Friday night, in an accident in which the woman driver of the car which struck the truck was killed.

Ben and Dick Henzel left for Willows Saturday upon hearing of the wreck and had not returned Monday morning.

Men taking the truck to San Francisco at the time were Curtis Godsey and Ben Dungen. Neither was hurt.

The accident occurred when the woman, driving a passenger car, apparently skidded in loose gravel and struck the truck. Name of the woman victim is not known here.

Several hogs were killed in the smash-up and all others escaped, resulting in a considerable loss to Henzel brothers.

Civilian Goods Lend-Leased to North Africa

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30 (AP)—More than \$5,000,000 worth of civilian goods is to be shipped to French North Africa and a program has been prepared for the purchase of additional civilian supplies of "many times that value," the office of war information announced today.

Civilian supplies will be sent as rapidly as shipping space becomes available.

The purchase program includes sugar, powdered and evaporated milk, green tea and cheese—the most urgent food needs of the people there. Considerable quantities of cotton textiles, piece goods and ready-made new and used clothing and shoes also will be lend-leased.

Hundreds of medical and hospital supplies, from bandages and surgical instruments to sulfa drugs and anti-toxins, are included.

The only test for military equipment is actual combat. FARMERS TOLD OF HUGE TASK

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30 (AP)—The agriculture department told American farmers today that the United States' food strategy for 1943 placed upon them the responsibility of producing more supplies than ever before despite shortages of labor, machinery and equipment.

In addition to meeting domestic requirements, agriculture must supply at least a fourth of its expected production to a United Nations' pool to feed military forces and civilians. This is double the amount that went into this year's pool.

In making known next year's needs, the department outlined production goals for various crops and livestock, dairy and poultry products. They will be apportioned among farmers on the basis of available land, manpower and equipment.

In general, the goals called for sharp increases in the output of meats, dairy and poultry products, peanuts for vegetable oil, corn for livestock feed, long-staple cotton, dry beans and peas and potatoes. It asked that wheat and short-staple cotton production be reduced because present supplies are large, and that the extra land and labor be used for more essential products.

TRIBAL LOAN BOARD BRANCH WILL OPEN

Due to the rationing of gasoline and necessary conservation of rubber, the chairman of the Klamath Tribal Loan board, Judge Levi Walker, has made arrangements through the Klamath Agency office to open a branch office at Beatty, thus saving those who have business with the board and who live on the eastern portion of the reservation many miles of travel heretofore required to reach the main office at the agency council house.

The regular office days of Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays at the agency will continue as heretofore. It is planned to have two days a week set aside at Beatty, probably Fridays and Saturdays, commencing December 4. This arrangement may need adjustment later but will be in effect for the time being. Any changes decided upon will be announced in advance.
