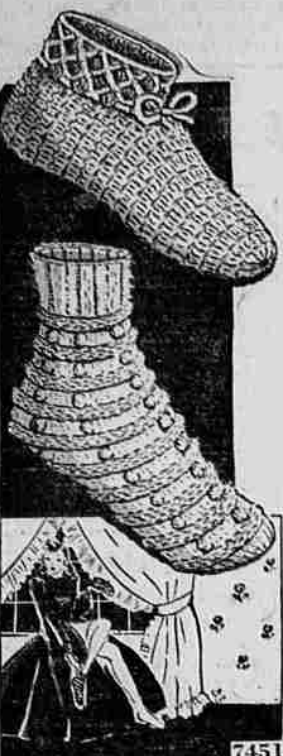

48-Hour Week Prevails In Lumber Report

SEATTLE, Dec. 1 (P)—J. B. Fitzgerald, in a press statement for the Lumbermen's Industrial Relations committee, last night denied the operations were responsible for failure to utilize logging and sawmill facilities to full capacity.

In a weekend statement, Karley Larsen, president of the northern Washington council of the (CIO) Sawmill and Timber Workers union, said about half the men in the logging industry were not permitted to work more than 40 hours a week, and many were limited to less. Fitzgerald said 219 Douglas fir area operators had qualified for an OPA extra \$1 per thousand and feet log scale by proving they were operating on 48-hour weeks. He said they represented at least 90 per cent of the log production.

He said companies reported lost working time through absenteeism of employees and inability to get replacements.

Legislators Face Housing Shortage

SALEM, Dec. 1 (P)—Legislators, who will meet here January 11, are finding it hard to find housing for the session, Rep. Herman Chindgren, Molalla, said here yesterday. Chindgren said he has been house-hunting for a month without success.

He said some legislators might have to sleep on cots in the capitol.

LICENSE STICKERS WILL BE OUT SOON

The windshield stickers validating the 1943 motor vehicle registrations will be available early in December, but all motorists should bear in mind that the 1942 plates must be left on their cars, it was announced today at the secretary of state's office.

For the first time since Oregon started issuing annual license plates, no new plates will be issued to motorists whose cars were registered in this state in 1942. They will receive instead

a sticker, commemorating the one hundredth anniversary of the great immigration to Oregon in 1843. This sticker is to be placed in the upper center of the windshield, directly behind the rear-view mirror.

Motorists were urged to make their applications early this year in order to avoid the mail rush of the holiday season. Stickers must be on the windshields after January 1, but they may be attached any time after December 15.

PRIVATE PRAISES FRENCH FIGHTING

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1 (P)—Pvt. Robert L. Bethel of Amusville, Ore., returned from North Africa with praise for French fighting and for French friendliness.

He was among the 107 American wounded brought to Walter Reed hospital last week and interviewed by army press officers.

Bethel was a member of an infantry unit that landed near Fedala in Morocco and attacked Casablanca. He said the French

opened fire on them while they were more than four miles from their objective.

"The sniper fire was good. As for the artillery, it was in the groove," Bethel said. He shot four snipers before being wounded in the arm by shrapnel. The French hospitalized him at Casablanca, and he spoke warmly of the friendly and expert care there.

Last of French Islands Joins Fighting French

LONDON, Dec. 1 (P)—The French island of Reunion has joined the forces of fighting France. General Charles De Gaulle's headquarters announced Monday, following a bloodless landing upon the island of a force composed entirely of fighting French.

The announcement that the Indian ocean outpost had aligned itself with the fighting French followed a Vichy radio announcement that Reunion had surrendered under a two-hour ultimatum presented by "allied forces."

Contrary to the Vichy report,

the DeGaullists emphasized that only fighting French participated in the operation, which wrested from Vichy France the last of the French islands under its control.

Beans for "Pepper-Upper" Vitamins

BOSTON BAKED BEANS (Patriotic too)
8 cups soaked dried beans
14 cups ketchup
14 cups onion
14 tsp. prepared mustard
14 tsp. paprika
14 tsp. salt
1 cup water
2 cups dark molasses
3 slices bacon

Place cooked beans in well-greased 1 1/2 qt. casserole. Thoroughly combine onion, mustard, paprika, salt, water and molasses. Pour over beans. Strip with bacon. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) 1 hour and 15 minutes or until browned. Serves 6.

THIS IS IMPORTANT

UP-TO-DATE bean cookery suggests that to cook navy, lima, pink and red, kidney or cranberry beans, you pick over beans carefully, removing any damaged beans or foreign particles. Wash well in sieve or bowl. *Do not soak. Improved agricultural methods have made it possible to produce more tender beans with tender skins. Soaking will cut cooking time about one-third, but makes beans mushy and unattractive. Place in kettle at least 4 times greater in volume than beans. Add hot water to cover and 1 tsp. salt for each cup beans and cover. Cook at simmering temperature until beans are tender, 2 to 3 hours. Add more water as needed to keep beans well covered during cooking.

*Limas should be soaked in water to cover 6 to 8 hours or over night as they cling to their tough outer skin.
