Ice Cream Menus Are a Bit Limited in Klamath

You can still take your choice of vanilla, chocolate or strawberry, but ice cream menus end there. Not even a popsicle, ice cream bar or a dish of sherbet to choose from.

Ice cream fans began to wonder if the recent restrictions in the use of butterfat which resulted in the clamp on whipping cream sales, would affect the ice cream market, but a survey of local creameries put the worried ones at rest.

One dairyman pointed out that there is a 12 per cent use of butterfat in ice cream as compared to 20 per cent in coffee cream, still available. The late whipping cream boasted 33 per cent butterfat.

Certain restrictions as to quantity may be demanded in the future, dairymen observed. They have cut down considerably on the types of ice cream and only the three staple flavors are offered locally. Some manufacturers are offering one "special" a week as an extra treat.

Fancy moulds are out so if you planned miniature ice cream Santa Claus or Christmas trees for your next holiday dinner you had just better stick to a slice of vanilla brick.

The old ice cream freezer is liable to come out of the basement yet—if the government doesn't clamp down on salt.
