CANADA ACTS TO

OTTAWA, Dec. 4 (P)-In a pre-Christmas gift to ease the strain of the high cost of living on the consumer's purse, the Canadian government is taking direct action to give the nation heaper coffee, tea, oranges and

The new assault on the cost of living, to be effected by re-ducing duties or taxes or by outright subsidies, was announced last night by Finance Minister J. L. Ilsley, who estimated that the cost to the treasury might run up to \$40,000,000 a year. Coffee is to be reduced four cents a pound, ten 10 cents a

pound and milk two cents a quart from current retail prices.

Orange prices are to be put back to about the levels of September and October, 1941. No official figures were given but in September, 1941, oranges were being sold for 25 to 25. being sold for 25 to 35 cents a dozen.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4 (P)-President Roosevelt today or-dered complete liquidation of

the work projects relief program. The president, in a letter to Major General Philip B. Fleming, federal works administra-tor, said the WPA rolls had greatly decreased through the "tremendous increase in private employment, assisted by the training and re-employment efforts of its own organization, to a point where a national work relief program is no longer necessary."

Local Assistance

Mr. Roosevelt ordered the closing out of all project operations in many states by February 1, 1943, and in other states as soon thereafter as feasible.

Mr. Roosevelt said certain relief rolls may have to be given assistance by the states and localities: Others would be able to find work on farms or in in-dustry at prevailing rates of pay

as private employment continues to increase. "Some of the present certified war projects," he added, "may have to be taken over by other units of the federal works agency or by other departments of the federal government. State or local projects should be closed out by completing useful units of such projects or by arranging for the sponsors to carry on the work."

FDR JUSTIFIES

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4 (P)— Replying to critics of his recom-mendation for power to suspend the tariff and immigration laws whenever he deems it necessary to support the war effort, President Roosevelt told reporters to-day that it was intended, under the immigration part, to bring in to this country only two or three dozen persons a year.

A questioner at his press con-ference noted that most of the criticism had been directed against suspending the immigration laws for fear it would let down the bars to unwanted individuals.

The president replied he did not care how the bill was worded and said the few persons the government wanted to let in would be needed to strengthen the war effort. He agreed with a questioner that that was all that the shouting was about at the capitol.


