

ICE CREAM OUTPUT CUT 20 PER CENT

Commercial manufacture of ice cream, frozen custard, milk sherbet and other frozen desserts and of ice cream mix during December and January is reduced by about 20 per cent below estimated 1942-43 winter output to conserve butterfat for butter, by an order announced by the director general for operations.

At the same time, the order provides that formulas used by manufacturers during October 1942, must not be changed while the order is in effect. This means that quality of all brands must be preserved at present levels. However, flavors and coloring may be changed.

The order, issued at the request of the food requirements committee, is a temporary one designed to help relieve, during December and January the most critical butter shortage in ten years. A more comprehensive order will be prepared for issuance later.

Clyde E. Beardslee, chief of the dairy products section, WPB, said that the butterfat saved by the order will make about 3,300,000 pounds of butter during December. This would be about three per cent of the approximately 117 million pounds of butter produced in December 1941.

ENFORCED PEACE RULES MANZANAR

MANZANAR, Calif., Dec. 8 (AP)—Army-enforced peace prevailed at the Manzanar relocation center today as military authorities, ready for any emergency, announced evacuation of all non-Japanese personnel.

The army said the evacuation order, particularly as it affected women and children, would remain in force until certain identification of all the axis sympathizers who Sunday provoked a riot which compelled troops to fire into a throng of Japanese, killing one and wounding eight.

Military police on duty at the center have been augmented by other army units, and the place was under strict military rule. A rigid censorship had been invoked, and camp authorities early today refused any comment on the situation.

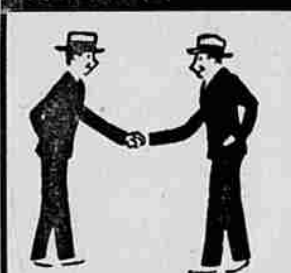
