45 TONS OF WAR SCRAP COLLECTED

BONANZA — Bonanza high school has gathered and delivered more than 45 tons of war salvage since the beginning of school. It was estimated today. Of this, 3417 pounds were rubber, 72,970 were scrap steel and 13,420 were cast.

The ground in front of the school was used, and many patriotic citizens deposited their contributions, besides the tons of material that the students gathered. This ground is all cleared for at least a short time and the many truckloads are on their way to Uncle Sam's war industries.

To the above amount can be added 10 tons that the FFA boys gathered last spring, making Bonanza high school responsible for 55 tons of salvage, to date.

The students started their drive the first month of school with a patriotic program dedicated to the soldiers. Each school organization gave an original skit and the school poets competed for a prize offered for the best verse, featuring the gathering of scrap iron. The poets who won the prizes were Elsa Hartley and Laura Pankey for senior high school, and Gilbert Joyce for the junior high.

Trucks hauling the scrap were donated by Gene Horsley, Charles Hartley, Howrey Roberts and Lloyd Sparks.

SEAL SALE BOOTHS SET UP AT CENTER

NEWELL, Calif. — Tuberculosis Christmas seals went on sale on Monday throughout the project, sponsored by the orderlies of the project base hospital. Booths have been set up at the administration building, mess hall, postoffice, all canteens, and library.

"Remember Pearl Harbor" was the theme of a dance given Monday evening by the Ten Hi Press club, a club of aspiring young journalists and students. Refreshments and decorations were donated by community activities department so that all proceeds derived from the affair could be given to the American Red Cross. Tickets at 25c each, and special booths where artificial flowers were sold, swelled the proceeds to almost \$100.

Forty-nine young Japanese-Americans have left the project to continue their education in American schools and colleges, 17 others, who have requested admittance to universities throughout the country, have been cleared and will leave shortly.

A dance and entertainment sponsored by the nurses and orderlies of the base hospital will be given December 11 for the benefit of the shut-ins, especially the children. Proceeds from this dance will provide the inmates of the hospital with Christmas trees and decorations and durable toys for children, such toys as can be cleaned and washed and left at the hospital for the use of other children.
