Call for Bonds—In answer to numerous requests for delivery of bonds contracted for during the Women at War Week drive, the Klamath Falls Commandos announced today that those who purchased bonds may call for them at the bank which they designated on their purchase slip. The government, the Commandos explained, pays postage for mailing of bonds outside the community, but has asked that people call at the banks for their bonds if they live near.

INSECTICIDE JUG WAS DECEIVING

A three-gallon jug of insecticide which John Dow Hall, 34, thought was port wine, proved his downfall early Friday morning shortly after he had broken the plate glass window out of Sears Roebuck farm store on Klamath avenue and made off with the bottle.

Hall was charged with burglary not in a dwelling in a complaint filed in the district attorney's office early Friday afternoon. He was moved from the city jail to the county bastille.

According to city police, Hall was picked up about 2:45 a. m. after an officer had noticed a man walking in front of Sears on South Seventh street with a jug in his arms. The building was checked and the Klamath avenue window noted. Officers picked up Hall who admitted he had knocked the big window out with his foot in an effort to get the jug labeled, "Check-R-Lineum, Kills Mites, Ticks, Fleas and Bedbugs." Hall also admitted he had thrown a brick through the Schuss Wine shop window on Main to get a bottle of liquor Thursday night.

When Hall was arrested one hand was bleeding, police said. He was not intoxicated at the time. Hall came here from Lakeview but is a former California resident. He was unemployed, officers said.

Jury Empaneled For Traffic Death Case

SPOKANE, Dec. 11 (P)—A district court jury was empaneled yesterday for the trial of Jacob Hettinger, charged with involuntary manslaughter in the traffic death of James M. Cummins, 36, Klamath Falls.

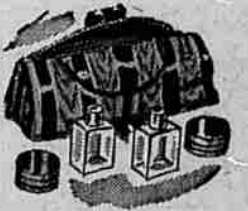
