GROWERS TELL OF HEARING ON SPUD CEILING

TULELAKE—O. A. Schultz, Chester J. Main, F. S. Terry and D. M. Crawford, Tulelake growers who recently presented protests before a senate hearing in Sacramento on the government ceiling on potatoes, reported on that session before the Tulelake Modoc Farm center Monday night, revealing that the ceiling price of \$2.10 recently established by OPA will be adjusted soon.

The hearing was obtained, according to the committee, through efforts of the Farm Bureau, which is bringing pressure to bear on congressmen and OPA officials relative to the potato ceiling.

LAKEVIEW—A \$20 dinner commemorating Pearl Harbor, was sponsored by the Lakeview Rotary club and held in the basement dining rooms of the First Methodist church Monday night, December 7.

Bond sales for the banquet totaled \$17,925, many buying far beyond the allotted \$18.75. 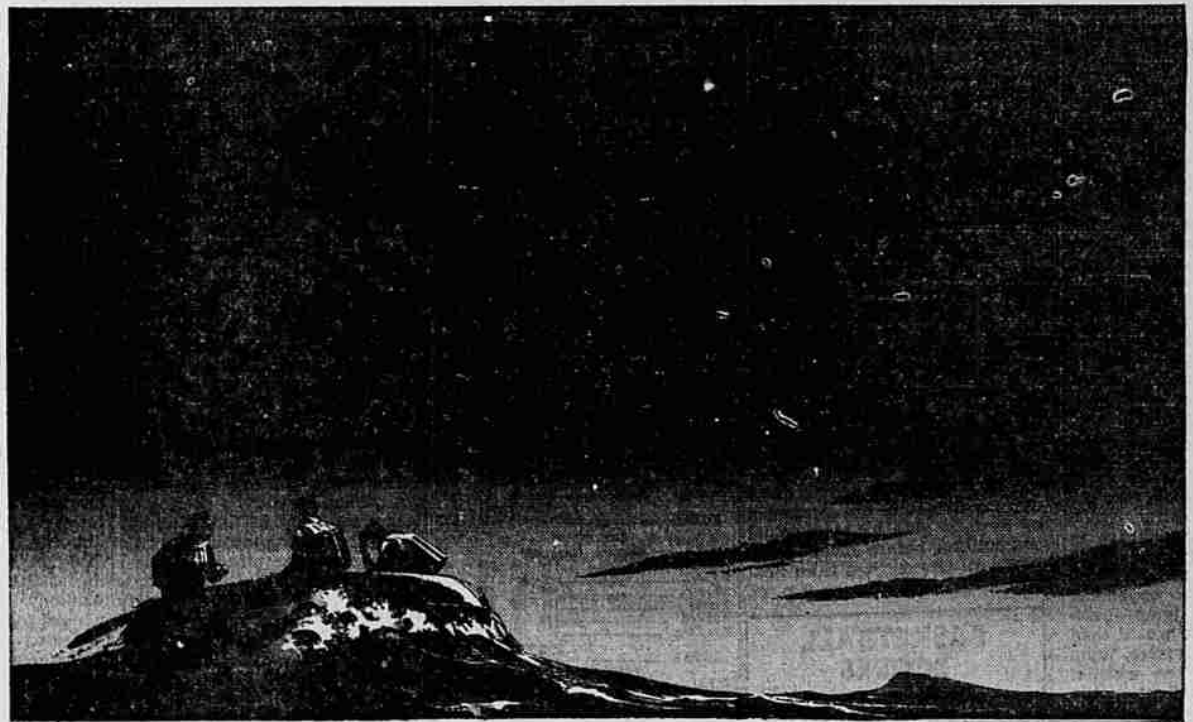
