

ALBANY JUDGE ASSIGNED TO KLAMATH CASE

Circuit Judge L. G. Lewelling of Albany has been assigned to the case of the state versus Klamath County Clerk Mae K. Short, who has been indicted on a charge of receiving unauthorized payments for overtime work on election duties and for compiling records for the county dog control board.

Judge Lewelling has notified the clerk of the supreme court at Salem he will be unable to come here until mid-January to sit on the case. Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg of Klamath Falls has been disqualified in the case.

Bond Provided
The amount involved in the case is \$95. The jury charged Mrs. Short with receiving unauthorized payments of \$20 and \$25 on election work, and \$50 from the dog board, on the grounds that these are official duties for which she is paid \$2400 a year.

The clerk has provided bond, and it has been indicated she will fight the accusations on the grounds that the payments were legal.

Question Involved
Mrs. Short put in the claims for overtime work after the elections, the records showing both passing through the regular channels. The state auditors reported that the claims were approved by the county court, but said one of them was not signed by the court members, although it showed as approved in the commissioner's journal. The claim for \$50 for compiling dog board records was approved by the dog board.

The question involved in the case, it was pointed out Saturday, is whether the law provides for extra payment of the clerk for such work, or whether it falls within the duties of the clerk for which she receives her statutory salary.

J. H. Carnahan has been retained by Mrs. Short as her attorney, it was learned Saturday.

DEMOCRATS TURN EYES ON MIDWEST

National political leaders turned suddenly speculative eyes on the midwest and deep south today as a "diagnostic" democratic huddle developed in the wake of critical rumblings from the party's chief sectional stronghold.

Under the cloud of third party threats from two democratic stalwarts — a former cabinet member and a southern governor — democratic leaders from nine midwestern states met today in a surprise session in Omaha in an announced effort to form a united front.

Only the importance attached to the meeting by national party heads — reportedly not even consulted in its calling — seemed likely to save it from the stamp of a rump conference. Nebraska National Committeeman James C. Quigley said that Eugene Casey, special assistant to President Roosevelt, and Oscar R. Ewing, national democratic party vice chairman, will participate and attributed their planned attendance to Washington's interest in the event.

Nine motorists were hailed into court on charges of running red lights and two arrested on no operator's license complaints as city police continued their roundup of traffic violators. Four drunks and one vagrant appeared in police court Saturday morning.

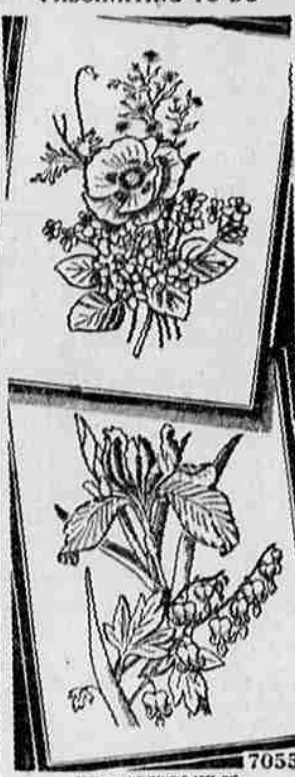

Big Work Still Remains To Be Done in African Campaign, Says Stimson

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12 (P)—Emphasizing that the North African campaign is merely beginning, Secretary of War Stimson declared today that "the main and big work still remains to be done when steps can be completed to give us air supremacy."

When that air superiority is obtained, he said, three objectives lie ahead:

1. To expel or destroy axis forces in Tunisia.
2. To attack Tripoli and destroy the Germans under Rommel by getting behind him.
3. To cooperate with the British in making the North African coast and the Mediterranean a safer line reaching to the Egyptian area.

Stimson said light forces of both the allies and the axis now are engaging in what might be described as feeling out the enemy.

At the same time, he continued, United States units not only are gaining valuable experience in their frontal contacts with the enemy, but are forestalling any German attempts to improve the enemy's positions.

Stimson told his press conference that two events—calm weather on a normally stormy front and the orders of Admiral Jean Danjan for the laying down of French arms—contributed greatly to success in North Africa.

Darlan's action, he said, could not have been anticipated and, together with the fortunate calm weather put the campaign "about a month ahead of schedule."

Stimson contrasted the North African campaign with the Japanese drive through the South Pacific, saying Japan had adjacent air, land and sea forces to support moves against India-China, the Philippines, Singapore, Borneo, Java, New Guinea and the Solomon Islands.

In the African campaign those conditions, he said, were precisely reversed.

A "very powerful enemy," he said, controlled Europe and islands in the Mediterranean and control of the Mediterranean was divided and in dispute.

"So at North Africa, a surprise was absolutely necessary and that was the only way it could be a success," the secretary said.

**138 Instrumentalists
Enrolled in Music Course**
The public school course in instrumental music (orchestra and band) instituted at the beginning of the school year has developed beyond the expectations of the administration, it was stated Saturday.

One hundred and thirty-eight beginning instrumentalists have been enrolled in the first year classes. This includes students on instruments of the string, woodwind, brass and percussion families.

These classes are under the direct supervision of Andrew Loney, Jr., director of music education in the public schools of Klamath Falls.

In most cases the classes are being held in the individual school buildings, and qualified music teachers in each building are conducting the classes. Teachers contributing to this program are Little Darby, supervisor of elementary vocal music; Mrs. Doris Frederick; Mrs. Mary Van Vactor; Mrs. Irma Badger, Patricia Talbot and Mrs. Fern Peake. Instruction on band and orchestra instruments is offered free-of-charge. In addition to the beginning classes, intermediate bands, orchestras and instrumental classes have a total enrollment of 144 throughout the system.

A music festival is planned for early spring, at which time the people of Klamath Falls will have an opportunity to observe the work of these groups as well as other music activities of the schools.

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BABY DIES IN FIRE AS RESCUE FAILS

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 12 (P)—A baby died and her grandmother was critically hurt in an attempt to rescue her from their burning home here today.

Katherine Ann, 6 months old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Larry Mormance, defense workers, apparently was asphyxiated. Her body was found, wrapped in a blanket, where the grandmother, Mrs. Katherine Stodole, 52, dropped her. Mrs. Stodole was possibly fatally burned.

Mrs. Stodole's 13-year-old son, Jerry, leaped from a second story window, escaping with slight burns and smoke injury.

Passersby found Katherine Ann's body in a rear bedroom and the unconscious grandmother in the dining room. The seven-room house was destroyed.

The baby's mother is a shipyard worker and her father works for a manufacturing firm.
