

BLANKS NOT NEEDED FOR AUTO LICENSE

SALEM, Dec. 12 (P)—Motorists who are not seeking farm, truck or bus licenses do not need application blanks to obtain their 1943 auto registrations, the state department emphasized here today.

All a motorist has to do is fill out the form on the reverse side of his 1942 registration slip and mail it to the state motor vehicle division, Salem, along with his check or money order for the usual \$5 fee, the department explained.

Supplies Shipped

Applicants for farm, truck or bus licenses may obtain necessary affidavit forms from their nearest sheriff's office if they live outside of Salem or Portland.

The state department said supplies needed by the sheriff's offices were shipped some time ago and temporary license stickers Thursday.

The 1943 vehicle licenses consist of three by four-inch windshield stickers, to be used along with 1942 plates. Mailing of these stickers will start Monday.

Animal Keeper Clawed To Death by Tiger at Zoo

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla., Dec. 12 (P)—Wallace Ayers, 25, an animal keeper at Clyde Beatty's zoo and lion farm, was killed late yesterday by the claws and teeth of a tiger, which in turn was killed by a black bear.

Albert Fleet, head keeper, said Ayers was attacked when he turned the corner of a tent and came suddenly upon the tiger lying in his path. He was clawed and bitten and died before reaching a hospital. Fleet and others drove the

tiger off. The infuriated animal jumped into a pen housing a bear, which immediately engaged him in battle. The bear won quickly.

The incident occurred late in the day, shortly after feeding time. The tiger was in an exercise area surrounded by a moat that protects the public from the uncaged beasts.
