

# NETHERLANDS GETS DUTCH NAZI LEADER

LONDON, Dec. 14 (AP)—Adolf Hitler has designated Anton Mussert, an obscure Dutch politician, "fuehrer" of the Netherlands people in his "new European order" and axis radios followed up the announcement with reports that powerless France under Marshal Henri Petain is moving closer to cooperation with Germany.

Petaim, these German reports said, has agreed to Hitler's proposal to raise a new French army "capable of insuring the safety of France and her colonial empire." At the same time, fighting French sources here said, Hitler has demanded 400,000 French workers for labor in Germany.

**Convert Dutchmen**  
The elevation of the Dutch quisling Mussert was announced by Arthur Seyz-Inquart, German commissioner for the Netherlands who obviously will continue to rule the country.

Mussert, whose nazi party failed to make any spectacular headway even after the Germans occupied the country, will try to convert the extremely independent and outspoken Dutch people to the nazi way of life, it is expected. His tenure as fuehrer is expected to depend on his success in this task.

**Cannon Fodder**  
Seyz-Inquart also announced that Mussert's participation in the government would bring forth a new series of decrees. Observers said this probably means new oppressive measures against the Jews in Holland, a course which Mussert has advocated over strong Dutch opposition since the country was occupied, and other laws following the nazi line.

The Russian news agency Tass from Stockholm that Hitler had demanded the mobilization of 250,000 Dutchmen for the German army.

Seyz-Inquart also disclosed that as a precaution against allied invasion he would "move certain of my departments and certain departments of the Dutch administration" from the Hague where they were "within easy reach by plane and also easy for the enemy's navy to shell."

# MEAT SHORTAGE ACUTE IN SEATTLE

SEATTLE, Dec. 14 (AP)—The executive council of the state restaurant association announced Saturday it had taken no official action on proposals for meatless days in Seattle eating establishments each week, but Manager R. W. Dale said the meat shortage is such that "half the restaurants in Seattle are now operating on more or less meatless menus."

Meatime, Arnold Drimmel, sales manager for one of the city's four large packing houses, said that "Seattle is receiving about 30 per cent less meat than cities which have not experienced mushroom growth on account of war industries."

It will receive even less starting January 1. Drimmel explained it this way: Office of price administration meat quotas are set at 70 per cent of the meat slaughtered in the last three months of 1941—when Seattle's population was about 400,000.

"In the past year," he added, "about 200,000 new people have moved into Seattle and adjacent territory served by Seattle packers. Now, the OPA has decreed that, beginning January 1, 1943, meat quotas will be based on 70 per cent of meat slaughtered in the first three months of 1941—when there were only about 365,000 persons here."

The units of local 751, International Aeronautical Machinists (IAM), the Boeing local, urged the labor board to action in telegrams which emphasized that although the unions would keep on work, the morale of individual workers could not be maintained under the uncertain wage conditions.

# SNELL TO ASK ONLY WAR LEGISLATION

SALEM, Dec. 14 (AP)—Governor-elect Earl Snell said he would ask the legislature to consider only legislation dealing with the war effort and other measures which are essential to the welfare of the state.

"This has been the expressed desire of every member of the legislature with whom I have discussed the matter," Snell said. "They may be assured the fullest cooperation of the executive department."

"Most of the members, as well as those who by necessity are required to be present at a legislative session, occupy important posts at home in our war effort and should be permitted to return to those duties at the earliest possible date."

"This coming session should be one of the shortest sessions for many years, and such action certainly would be received with wholehearted approval throughout the state."

# FACULTY MEMBERS EXCEED BOND PLAN

Klamath Union high school faculty members have exceeded 10 per cent gross earnings participation in war savings.

S. D. Woodruff, principal, so reported today to Vern Owens, chairman of the payroll deduction program in the county.

Woodruff said there are 45 members of the high school faculty, with a gross monthly payroll of \$6963.93. Forty-five are participating in war bond purchases, with a total monthly bond purchase of \$716.18, or 10.3 per cent of gross salaries.

# POISONING BLAMED ON LACK OF FUNDS

PORTLAND, Dec. 14 (AP)—The Oregon League of Women Voters today blamed the recent fatal poisoning of 47 inmates of the state insane asylum on the state's stringent financial policy.

A pamphlet issued by the league said, "only three states in the nation spend less for the care of their mentally diseased than Oregon."

The pamphlet continued, "lack of attendant care leads to accidents, excessive use of restraint (straight jackets, straps, manacled devices), increased possibility of suicide, neglected

health and limited therapeutic treatments."

It listed Oregon's expenditures for mental hospitals at \$163.68 for each patient, compared to the national average of \$300.71. Dr. John C. Evans, asylum superintendent, said after the poisonings that because of the lack of funds inmates were used for a number of chores. The poisonings occurred after an inmate was sent for powdered milk and returned with poison, he said.

# 78TH CONGRESS TO CONVENE JAN. 6

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (AP)—Speaker Rayburn said today congressional leaders had agreed to convene the 78th congress January 6 and that President Roosevelt would deliver his message in person to a joint session of the senate and house January 7.

The president was told, Rayburn said, that the historic 77th congress would adjourn Wednesday of this week, "or certainly not later than Thursday."

While plans for adjournment of the 77th congress and convening of the 78th appeared to be definite, they must be embraced

in a house-senate resolution to make them final.

Rayburn gave no indication of points the president might discuss in his message. He explained that the president would appear January 7 because the sixth would be given over to organization matters in the house and senate.

Rayburn was conceded to be certain of re-election as speaker, and the choice of Senator Barkley (D-Ky.) to serve another term as senate democratic leader appeared to be a foregone conclusion.
