SINKING CANYON IS SINKING AGAIN

BUHL, Ida., Dec. 14 (AP)—Southern Idaho's sinking canyon is sinking again.

Five years ago a section of land along the canyon formed by Salmon Falls river sank to a depth of 50 feet. Enterprising ranchers set up a toll gate at the entrance to a private road leading to the phenomenon and collected fees from interested motorists.

Now Claud Read, a resident of the area, has found a similar sinking about 10 miles from the site of the 1937 earth movement.

He said the earth and rock had slid into the river, forming a dam which had backed up the water for nearly a mile. The mass, about 500 feet long and 200 feet thick, still was moving slowly late today, Read said.

Water backed up behind the dam is nearly 70 feet deep, Read said, and only a trickle thus far is escaping. There is no danger of flooding farmlands, however, because the canyon is several hundred feet deep.

Geologists said they believed the 1937 sinkings were caused by the breaking down of subterranean caverns, probably formed by water seepage.

HOOD RIVER LAD GETS CITATION

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (AP)—Charles Edward Savo, 20, aviation machinist's mate, first class, of Hood River Ore., was one of 10 enlisted men advanced in rating by the commander of aircraft yesterday in the South Pacific.

The citation read: "For services performed while serving in the squadron to which he was attached. He distinguished himself by his duties of servicing, repairing and rearming the squadron's planes under the most difficult circumstances, in complete disregard of his own personal safety. His work has been a principal factor in the maintenance and repair of aircraft, many damaged planes having been continued in use through repairs skillfully effected with the salvaged parts of other planes."

AFL TURNS DOWN LABOR AGREEMENT

SALEM, Dec. 14 (AP)—The state building and construction trades council refused yesterday to ratify a labor agreement between construction employers and the AFL building and construction trade unions.

The council, holding its state convention here, named a committee to revise it and to resubmit it to another convention to be held here January 9 and 10.

The agreement includes a no-strike and no-lockout clause, and provides for arbitration of disputes.

The council ordered an investigation of the recent reduction in wages for construction laborers at Camp White, and asked the legislature to license contractors.
