

MEAT QUOTA FOR JANUARY MOVED AHEAD

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (AP)—Nationwide meat shortages will be relieved by an order the office of price administration is expected to issue allowing packers to begin slaughtering on their 1943 quotas December 10 instead of waiting until January 1, Representative Ward Johnson (R-Calif.) said today.

Johnson told reporters the order was expected to permit packers to slaughter between December 10 and the first of the year ten per cent of the quota allowed them for the first quarter of 1943.

New quotas to be allowed packers by OPA in 1943, Johnson said, would probably be lower on some meats, but added any details would have to come from OPA officials.

"The new quotas and the rationing planned for next year will not assist areas where there has been an influx of population," Johnson said, "unless some adjustment in distribution is made."

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 17 (AP)—An adequate supply of meat for Christmas—at the expense of next year's quotas—was assured five western states today in an OPA order releasing the next allotment on December 20, eleven days ahead of the former date, January 1, 1943.

The present supply would have been exhausted by December 20 in the regional area which includes California, Oregon, Washington, Nevada and Arizona, said Guy Kinsley, regional food rationing chief.

Slaughtering under the new order may begin making deliveries on the new quota December 20, but this does not mean additional meat for civilians—only that the supply will be spread out over a longer period.

GOVERNMENT FINES SOAP COMPANIES

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (AP)—The justice department announced today that it had filed a criminal information charging the nation's three largest manufacturers of soap and soap products with fixing prices in violation of the anti-trust law.

The information was filed in the federal district court at Newark, N. J., and the three companies and the president of each immediately pleaded nolo contendere and were fined \$10,000 each, the department said.

The defendants were listed as: Proctor and Gamble company, and Richard Deupre, president, Cincinnati; Colgate-Palmolive-Peete company, Jersey City, N. J., and E. H. Little, president, Orange, N. J.; and Lever Brothers company, Cambridge, Mass., and Francis H. Countway, president, Brookline, Mass.

TWO CHILDREN BURN TO DEATH IN WAR HOMES

Two children burned to death in the Puget Sound area last night when fire destroyed their parents' temporary war time homes.

The two-month-old son of Clara K. Smith, Bremerton navy yard worker burned to death and his mother, Mrs. Jean Smith, 20, was given but slight chance to recover from burns suffered when flames destroyed their trailer house at Port Orchard. The four-month-old baby son of Mr. and Mrs. John Umpeyer burned to death when fire destroyed their houseboat home on Lake Union in Seattle. The parents were visiting a neighbor. Deputy Coroner A. V. Anderson said a 4-year-old sister started the fire playing with matches.

Father Burned

The father is employed at the Seattle port of embarkation. The family formerly lived at Harrisburg and Elmira, Ore.

Smith was in a community bathroom when fire broke out in their trailer. He was severely burned when he dashed without an effort to save his wife and child.

Mrs. Smith and the baby were in bed at opposite ends of the trailer when the unexplained fire started. A neighbor with a wet blanket over his head rescued Mrs. Smith. An attempt to save the baby failed when the baby buggy was rolled out empty.

SERVICES HELD FOR ADON THOMAS

Funeral services for Adon Ney Thomas, 80-year-old Butte valley rancher, who died Friday at the Siskiyou General hospital in Yreka, were held Monday in the northern California city. Mr. Thomas was born near Carrallton, Mo., January 11, 1862, and with his family settled on a homestead near Dorris in Butte valley early in 1907.

Mr. Thomas is survived by his wife, Mary, five daughters, including Mrs. Pearl Carley of Malin, Mrs. Gracie L. Mitchell of Dorris, and Mrs. Katie Murphy of Klamath Falls, and one son, Cpl. William P. Thomas, who is stationed in Alaska with the U. S. army.

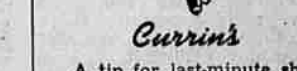


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Marjorie Ongman Takes First Prize in Contest
