The worst one of the year took the lives of Willard E. Jackson, farmer, and Louis Parker, farm hand, at the Stukel crossing on the Southern Pacific near Mac's store. Their car collided with a freight train. They're doing something at last about that Algoma flood. Dikes are repaired and water is being pumped off. The Pelican basketballers under their new coach, Wayne Scott, are starting off all right. They defeated Grants Pass, which has a good team, 42 to 36, Friday night of this week. Christmas shopping is still going big guns here. The choice of merchandise is not so wide as in peace time, but everybody is buying. Everybody seems to be remembering the men in the service. For instance, at the courthouse, where they always have a gift exchange and Christmas tree, all packages this year go to the service men. About 200 men from Camp White near Medford will be here for the Christmas weekend, and another 200 will be here for New Year's. Local people are asked to put up the boys in their homes. Elmer Shirrel, manager of the war relocation camp for Japanese at Newell, is leaving to take over a job of relocating Japanese-Americans, who are citizens of this country, in jobs in the middle west or elsewhere out of the restricted defense zones. ### WOODRUM URGES SAVE US ECONOMY

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19 (AP)—Appeal for wartime abandonment of "all further social and economic experiments and new ventures" came today from a leader of the southern democratic bloc in congress. Expressing hope that efforts "for a sane national fiscal policy may be about to bear fruit," Rep. Woodrum (D-Va.) declared that the nation's first objective must be financing and winning the war. "The American people," he said in an interview "are willing to be taxed for whatever it takes to train, equip and maintain our fighting forces. But they have a right to demand that all non-war activities be curtailed and expenditures for the same cut to the bone." "I believe the incoming congress will take note of this public demand," he added.

### NEWS from HOME

Local army recruiting commander Sergeant Frank J. Huhin explained today that the women's army recruiting drive under his direction will have the assistance of the American Legion auxiliary. Representing the auxiliary as WAAC recruiter is Mrs. C. Jester whose honorary appointment was announced recently by Colonel J. J. Fulmer, district recruiting officer for Oregon. Mrs. Jester will work with Sergeant Huhin in disseminating information about the women's army auxiliary corps. With the recent executive order expanding the size of the WAAC to 150,000 to meet the immediate need for women to release men for combat duty, thousands of women are being sought for immediate service with the corps. The quota assigned to the Oregon district is a large one. It presents itself as a challenge to the women of the state to enroll now so that this quota may be met as quickly as possible in order that Oregon will lead the nation in WAAC enrollment, it was emphasized. Women between the ages of 21 and 44, of good moral character, and in good physical condition are urged to enroll in the women's army now when the need for them is greater than ever before. All eligibles may apply for complete information and application forms at the army recruiting office in the Klamath Falls post office building.

### 21-Year-Old Girl on Stand For Slaying of Husband

BISBEE, Ariz., Dec. 19 (AP)—Cross-examination brought from 21-year-old Margaret Herlihy today the admission that she expects a baby soon, although she said she could not remember having marital relations with Capt. David D. Carr, whom she married in secret and killed two months later. "I am very hazy about that night in Agua Prieta when we got married," Miss Herlihy explained between sobs and fits of weeping. Recalling that she testified yesterday that she and Carr had not lived as man and wife after their Mexican marriage, John F. Ross, county attorney, asked Miss Herlihy: "Did you have any marital relations with him?" "Not to my knowledge," the girl replied. "I am very hazy about that night in Agua Prieta." "Did you consult a doctor?" "Yes." "Did he examine you as to being pregnant?" "Yes." "Did he tell you of your condition?" "He was trying to make certain, but it was too early." Defense counsel objected to the questioning and accused Ross of attempting to degrade the defendant in the eyes of the jury, but Ross countered that the girl's condition "might have had an important bearing on her motive," and was permitted to continue. ### 3-MAN PANELS TO AID RATIONERS

SALEM, Dec. 19 (AP)—The state defense council today sent out a memorandum asking county councils to appoint three-man panels to assist local war price and rationing boards in recording violations of price ceilings and answering questions concerning the price control program. Acting "with considerable reluctance" at the request of the OPA, the state council said the panels should come from present personnel of the local volunteer price boards. The memorandum explained that the council hesitated to pile additional duties upon the price board members. The panels will be instructed in their duties by price specialists to be sent out from the state OPA office.

### Oregon Is Out \$40,000 for Good Turn to Government

PORTLAND, Dec. 19 (AP)—The Oregon highway commission found Friday that it was out \$40,000 for a good turn it did the federal government. Engineer H. R. Baldoock reported to the commission at its meeting that weight limits for trucks were waived for government builders of Camp Adair, to expedite construction. Heavy loads broke down the pavement, requiring repairs costing \$40,000, the engineer explained. When he sought federal funds for the work, W. H. Lynch, district engineer of the public roads administration advised that such funds were not available, Baldoock reported. The commission decided to press the matter, and, failing, to change its policy.
