Christmas mail is at least 30 per cent heavier than last year already and the peak will not be reached until December 21. Ben Campbell, Portland superintendent of mails, said today . . . Salvage officials announced Portland collected 80 tons of tin cans in the recent campaign. Henry J. Kaiser, who plans to build airplanes to carry troops overseas, now is working on a plan to convert the planes, once overseas, to ambulances to bring back wounded men, Brig. Gen. Fred W. Rankin, chief consultant surgeon to the army, said in Portland . . . At Gold Hill the body of John R. Drew, 47, Medford, missing since November 29, was recovered from the Rogue river.

Harvey Cunningham, negro sentenced in Portland to die in the lethal chamber February

26, for the slaying of Richard F. Kerr, 36, was transferred from Portland to the state prison in Salem . . . Dr. Kalfred Dip Lum, a commissioner of overseas affairs for the Chinese republic, told the Portland Optimist club how the Chinese guerrillas lure Japanese to death . . . Such as the method of replacing a piece of telephone wire with a slender willow limb, which forces Jap soldiers to climb every pole to locate the break, the guerrillas meanwhile picking them off with rifles.

The state liquor control commission adopted a wine code in Portland that requires laboratory analysis of all wines offered for sale in Oregon, bars imitation and synthetic wines and sets up sanitary standards.

But yesterday Spike aroused himself from his comatose state, wobbled into his master's old bedroom, flopped at the head of the bed and wagged his tail weakly. Mrs. Morley didn't quite know what to think but it gave her a lift to see her son's pet display a flicker of interest in his whereabouts again.

So she got out a pair of Bill's old trousers and made a bed there for the dog. Spike nuzzled into the familiar cloth and took a nap. A little later he awoke and his eyes were brighter.

Mrs. Morley got him a little food. He ate it.

Flies at the army camp tried to rally Spike's spirits but failed and finally brought the dog home. A veterinarian said Spike, being essentially a one-man dog, has simply lost his appetite for food and life and there wasn't anything to do about it.
