WASHINGTON, Dec. 21 (AP)—Don't be surprised if someone hands you a wooden 3-cent piece one of these days. President Roosevelt approved Saturday an act of congress authorizing the substitution of other materials for strategic metals in minor coinage. The measure authorizes the secretary of treasury to prescribe regulations governing the weight, dimensions and shape of new pennies and 3-cent pieces. He could, but probably won't have them made of wood. The only specification is that they must fit coin-operated machines.

KNOX SUGGESTS TAGGING STORIES

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21 (AP)—The nation's newspapers now have the suggestion of Navy Secretary Knox—himself a publisher—that all stories emanating from enemy sources should be earmarked as such, in order that readers might recognize their possible propaganda purposes. Speaking "as a newspaperman," Knox, who is publisher of the Chicago Daily News, brought up the subject at a press conference recently after saying he had no information about the Nazi radio report that the Japanese had advanced across the Burma border into India. He cited similar reports in the past which he said unquestionably had been issued to serve enemy ends. Such stories, he said, should always be accompanied in print by an editor's note saying they come from enemy sources and are probably propaganda.
