announced in Cairo. The ship was last seen afire. The Italian communique said the environs of Naples and the stepping-stone island of Lampedusa, between Sicily and Tunisia, had been attacked and some damage caused.

The stirring news from Dakar was revealed in a dispatch from Associated Press Correspondent Joseph Morton, who was on hand to see the Americans move in by land, sea and air and join their French allies without demonstration or fanfare.

While their numbers were not large, the arrival of the Americans symbolized the addition of Dakar to the list of allied bases in Africa and left only a thin coastal strip of Tunisia and a slowly diminishing position of western Libya to the axis on the dark continent.

Morton said the Americans included members of the air forces and supply services, technicians and an army-navy commission headed by Vice Admiral William Glassford. The latter immediately began work to determine how the city's airports and excellent harbor facilities, as well as the remaining units of the French fleet, could best be fitted into the broad plan for expediting men and material to Africa and combatting the submarine menace off the African coast.

Horton said there was no doubt that 90 per cent of the population was glad to see the Americans.

DARWIN WISSENBACK MISSING IN ACTION

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went down in October, an incident witnessed by his brother from another plane in the same flight. They served as engineers on four-motored bombers.

Trained in Illinois
The family was informed Wednesday by the war department that Darwin is missing. It is believed he was on the bombing flight over Lille, France, last Sunday, in which six American bombers were lost.

The Wissembach twins joined the air corps in October, 1941, and received their training at Chanute Field, Illinois, and in New York City. Erwin became a technical sergeant and Darwin a staff sergeant. The two boys graduated from Klamath Union high school together. They formerly carried The Herald and News at Algona.

Loss Told
The family received a letter from Darwin after Erwin was reported missing last October. Darwin said he saw Erwin's plane when it was struck, and that it leveled off for a considerable distance before going down. Other members of the bombing flight reported seeing parachutes blossom out after the plane started down, and Erwin may have landed safely.

In his letter, Darwin told how much he missed his brother, to whom he had been so close throughout their lives.

nouncement today told of the wounding of three United States brigadier generals.

Brig. Gen. Albert W. Waldron of Rochester, N. Y., shot through the shoulder when only 25 yards from the enemy's lines near Buna, December 5, has been awarded the distinguished service cross by Gen. MacArthur for "extraordinary heroism in action."

Private Praised
With his orderly, Private James Borman of Madison, Wis., Gen. Waldron had been knocked down by a Japanese grenade, but both got up unhurt and pressed toward the enemy, a spokesman said. While moving forward under heavy fire "with complete disregard for his own safety," the general was hit.

Waldron, now in an Australian hospital, praised Private Borman for his fearless action in helping him from the field.

Brig. Gen. Cloves E. Byers of Columbus, Ohio, was hit on the hand by a sniper's bullet while leading an attack upon Buna village December 16.

Brig. Gen. Hanford MacNider of Mason City, Iowa, received eight wounds from a Japanese grenade in November. All three officers are expected to recover, a spokesman said.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 24 (AP)—Hitler sent it over and he can have it back—as bullets—Attorney General Biddle said in effect today as he directed the FBI to turn over to the treasury \$174,588.62 brought to this county by eight Nazi spy-saboteurs last June.

The money was found hidden under rugs, in false bottom bags and sundry hiding places after the eight invaders had been rounded up by G-men.

"This is a little Christmas present for Hitler," Biddle said.
