Finns Deny Any Knowledge of Pro-Jap Statements

WASHINGTON, Dec. 24 (AP)—Reports that Finnish cabinet members congratulated Japanese diplomats on the Pearl Harbor attack during a Japanese legation party in Helsinki December 7, brought from the Finnish legation here today the statement that the Finnish government had "no knowledge about the alleged congratulations."

The reports, disclosed by informed sources, stirred concern in official quarters in Washington but the state department withheld comment.

Finnish officials, the reports said, applauded motion pictures of the attack on Pearl Harbor.

Jewish Soldiers Offer Respite to Yanks on Christmas

LONDON, Dec. 24 (AP)—Hundreds of U. S. army men slated for routine duties during the holidays were given a respite today when every enlisted man of the Jewish faith in one of the largest units in England volunteered for duty so those of the Christian faith could get time off.

The offer, characterized as "a symbol of the complete understanding existing between religious groups in our armed forces," was made by the chairman of a Jewish organization within the unit after the members approved unanimously.

Witness Sentenced For Draft Evasion

PORTLAND, Dec. 24 (AP)—Ira Alfred Sutton, 25, who registered at Roseburg, was sentenced to three years in prison yesterday by Federal Judge Claude McCulloch for violating the selective service act.

Sutton is a member of the Jehovah's Witness religious sect.

Silk is used in the production of gun powder bags and other war materials; and stocking containers have been set up in retail stores to facilitate the collection of the needed goods.

All worn and discarded stockings of the following classifications are wanted in the war effort, Mrs. Gillen reported: all silk, all nylon, mixture of silk and nylon, mixture of silk and rayon, mixture of nylon and rayon, mixture of silk and cotton or nylon and cotton.

The stocking should first be washed before donating them.
