Williams Leads Americans For Runs Batted In, Bases

CHICAGO, Dec. 24 (P)—Ted Williams of the Boston Red Sox was the leader, without a close rival, in batting in runs and receiving bases on balls during the 1942 American league season, official statistics showed today. Thus Ted had these honors to add to his leading batting average of .356 and his high totals of 141 runs scored and 36 home runs.

The nearest anyone came to Williams total of 137 runs batted in was Joe DiMaggio of New York, who had 114. Other high R.B.I. men were Charlie Keller of New York, 108, Joe Gordon of New York, 103, and Bobby Doerr of Boston, 102.

DiMaggio was the top man last year with 125 and Williams was fourth with 120 behind Cleveland Jeff Heath's 123 and Keller's 122.

Williams received 145 bases on balls, with the next best marks being 114 by Keller and 106 by Les Fleming of Cleveland.

Sinkwich's Left Ankle Heals, Now Hurts Right

Kennedy, Jurkovich, Stauber, Porto Toss Ball for West in Shrine Tilt

PASADENA, Calif., Dec. 24 (P)—In case the public has become bored reading about Frankie Sinkwich's injured left ankle, it may now read about Frankie Sinkwich's injured right ankle.

Georgia's all-American back was just recovering from the earlier injury, to the point where Coach Wally Butts began believing he would be in top shape for the Rose bowl game New Year's day against the University of California at Los Angeles.

But late yesterday, on the final play of the afternoon scrimmage, Sinkwich came out of a pileup hobbling again, and was assisted off the field by Georgia trainers. It was his right ankle this time, and after the medics had given Frankie a preliminary going over, Coach Butts said he still hoped his top-flight passer and runner would be ready for action against the Bruins.

It was deemed highly unlikely, however, that Sinkwich would do any more heavy duty scrimmage before the bowl contest, and he may not go into the game as sharp as he would have had his underpinning held up under him.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 24 (P)—Western coaches, needing a passer to match the East's Paul Gurnea of Columbia in the Shrine East-West football game here New Year's day, had four leading prospects tossing the pigskin today.

These were, in order of the effectiveness they showed in yesterday's first serious practice, Bob Kennedy of Washington State, Jim Jurkovich of California, Bob Stauber of Missouri and Frank Porto, California.

None of these boys showed anything like the stuff Gurnea unloaded at the East camp. The Columbia ace tossed a succession of perfect passes that moved Andy Kerr of Colgate, Eastern co-coach to comment "He's the best college forward passer I've ever seen."

TUCSON, Ariz., Dec. 24 (P)—The top flight Second Air Force Bombers, after taking it easy today and tomorrow, will resume scrimmage and heavy drills Saturday in preparation for their New Year's day Sun bowl engagement in El Paso with Hardin-Simmons university.

Capt. William Reese, coach of the Bombers, said recent workouts have been light to permit his men to recover from effects of last Sunday's successful encounter with March Field's Flyers in Hollywood. All are expected to be fit by next Wednesday when the team leaves for El Paso.
