

APPEAL MADE FOR SALVAGE OF FATS HERE

Informed by the War Production board that the need for waste fats to make explosives for our fighting forces rapidly is becoming critical, Winifred K. Gillen, Klamath county's fat salvage chairman, this week urged housewives to renew their salvage of kitchen fats and turn in every available ounce to their nearest meat market.

"Klamath county's salvage of fats for November amounted to \$2,553 pounds over October but one to two billion pounds of valuable waste fats and oils go down the drain and into garbage cans of America each year," Mrs. Gillen pointed out in revealing that the waste-fat collection campaign is the government's effort to salvage as much of this material as possible. "Every pound of it can be used in America's munition factories," she said.

Continuing, the salvage chairman outlined four important steps that housewives should take in getting their fats into the war effort:

1. Save all waste fats—pan drippings from roast ham, beef, lamb and poultry . . . boiler drippings from steaks, chops, veal and bacon . . . deep fats, whether lard or vegetable shortening, from fried potatoes, fish, doughnuts, etc.
 2. Strain all fats so as to be sure that all foreign matter is removed and then pour into a clean, wide-mouthed can.
 3. Keep in a refrigerator or a cool, dark place until you have collected at least one pound.
 4. Take the fats to a meat dealer who is cooperating patriotically in this drive. He will weigh the can of fat, pay the established price for it and start it on its way to war industries.
- Two things NOT to do, Mrs. Gillen said, include:
1. Don't take less than one pound at a time to your meat dealer.
 2. Don't take your fats to the meat dealer on weekends if you can avoid it. Help him by returning them early in the week.

"The need is urgent," Mrs. Gillen concluded. "War in the Pacific has greatly reduced our supply of vegetable fats from the Far East and it is necessary to find substitutes for them. Moreover, fats make glycerine and glycerine makes explosives for us and our allies."

ENTIRE COMPANY ESCAPES SINKING

AN EAST COAST PORT, Dec. 26 (AP)—An entire ship's company of 52 escaped in three lifeboats when their medium-sized United States merchantman was torpedoed in the North Atlantic about the middle of November, survivors disclosed today.

A single torpedo, fired from an unseen submarine struck the starboard side of the vessel, near the No. 2 hold, they said. One lifeboat was wrecked by the explosion, but the merchant crew of 41 and the gun crew of 11 had ample time to abandon ship in good order in the three remaining boats.

They were picked up in about an hour by a rescue vessel and only one man, Romeo Bellevance, of Fall River, Mass., a merchant seaman, required medical attention. He suffered rope burns, caused by friction as he slid down a line to a lifeboat. Like most men of his calling, Bellevance's reaction to his experience was a desire to get back to sea.

Roosevelt Signs Indian Measures

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26 (AP)—President Roosevelt today signed a bill (S 2829) removing from the Wapato Indian irrigation project in Washington State certain non-irrigable land owned by Yakima Indians, and a similar bill (S-2830) cancelling irrigation assessments against non-irrigable Indian land in the Oroville-Tonasket irrigation district of Washington.

Also signed into law was a bill (S 2744) extending for 25 years the trust period governing land allotments of the Klamath river Indians in northern California.
