The Mothers and Daughters tea will also be given by each Scout troop in January.

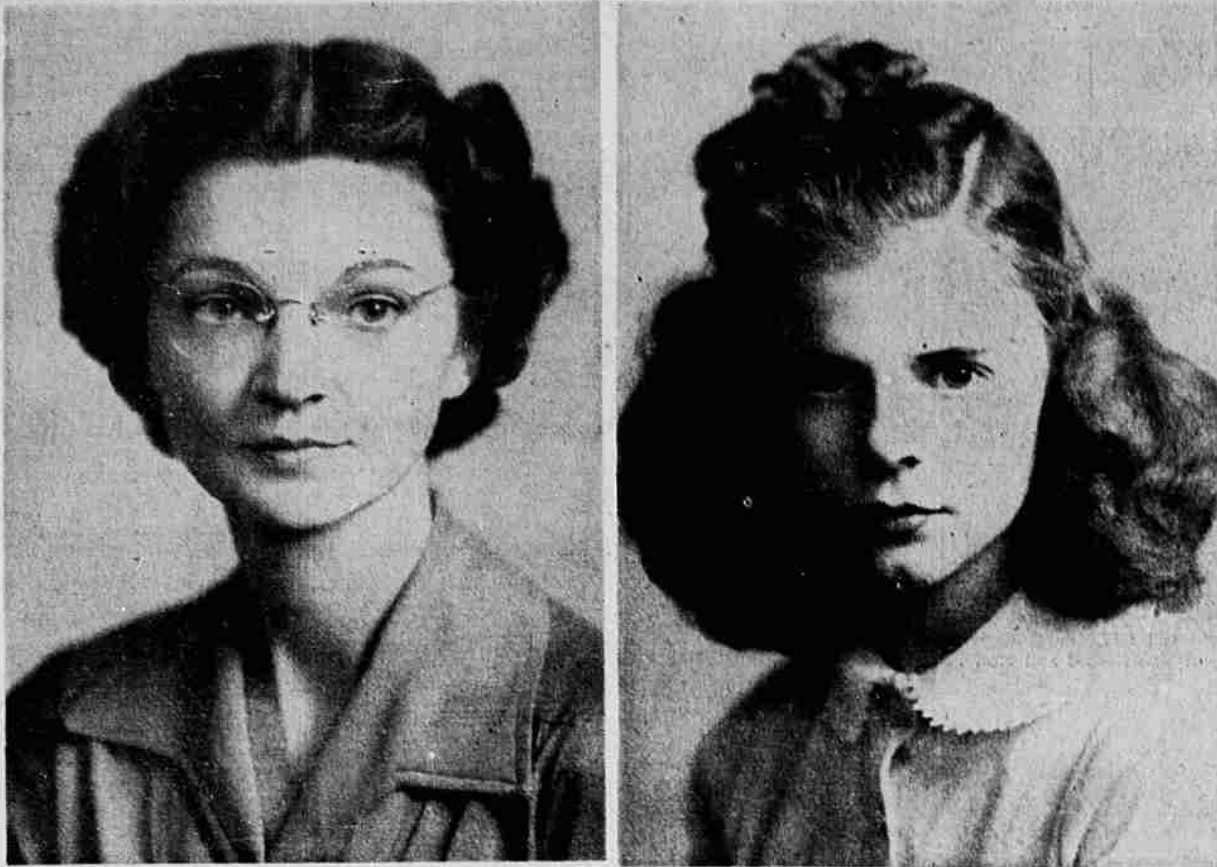
FATHERS ENJOY PARTY ON SUNDAY
