

Bulldogs Run--Run--Run, Bruins Just Scrimmage to Get Sharp for New Year's

Both Squads Ready For New Year's Bowl Battle

Experts Figure Georgia Bulldogs Two
Touchdowns Better Than UCLA Bruins

PASADENA, Calif., Dec. 28 (AP)—Both Georgia and UCLA appeared today to have achieved physical sharpness in their conditioning programs for Friday's football game in the Rose Bowl.

The California Bruins accomplished that state of affairs in the hard way, with several rough scrimmage sessions. Coach Babe Horrell believes in that type of approach. Before one important Pacific coast conference game he scrimmaged his squad an hour and one half. Georgia has rounded into form by running, more running and still more running.

Little Wally Butts, the Georgia tutor, has had his boys throwing and catching passes most of the time. If Georgia wins the Rose Bowl game, and most observers believe they will, they'll do it in the air. The UCLA line is tough to crack and Georgia hasn't won 10 games this year by the laborious method.

Alabama held the bulldogs to 62 yards rushing but Butts went wild in the last quarter to score three touchdowns. The Bruins netted 221 yards by pass in this one. Auburn, Georgia's only conqueror, held it to 37 yards on the ground and 190 in the air.

While there seems to be no tendency in either camp to underestimate the opposition, both are confident they are going to win. Butts has won his worrying contest with Horrell, hands down, by uttering not one optimistic sentence since his arrival, whereas the Babe did grudgingly admit his boys looked good in a recent scrimmage.

The Bruins are in a nice spot. They aren't expected to win. The so-called experts figure Georgia to be at least two touchdowns better. UCLA lost three games this year. They dropped their first two starts to Texas Christian, 7-6, and St. Mary's navy pre-flight, 18-7. Oregon beat 'em up north, 14-7, in a driving rainstorm.

In their own conference they lost only one game. The Pacific coast loop hasn't had an undefeated and untied team since the 1940 Stanford Indians of Clark Shaughnessy, and before that no team has gone through unscathed for about two decades.

STRIKES vs SPARE

Take a position toward the back of the alley approximating the position between the No. 1 and 3 pins, your target.

The distance from the starting point is regulated by the length of your natural stride and the number of steps required to advance to the foul line. I find four steps suitable and the even number of strides make for rhythm and balance.

Stand erect and relaxed with the ball resting in the left hand and fingers in place. This is a natural posture with the weight resting on the left leg. The feet should be approximately parallel, no more than two inches apart.

Determine the best spot to lay your ball on the alley, watch that spot throughout your approach and finish. This spot may be anywhere from six to eight inches from the right side of the alley, or left if you are left-handed.

The condition of the alleys is a determining factor in the selection of the spot. The ball will take more english on a worn alley.

If you get a pronounced hook, find out how close to the edge you must release the ball to make it break into the 1-3 pocket.

Bets Narrow For Cotton Bowl Battle

Georgia Tech, Texas Set
To Dallas for Bowl Tilt;
Tech Still 7-6 Favorite

DALLAS, Dec. 28 (AP)—Betting odds narrowed today on the outcome of the seventh annual Cotton Bowl game with arrival of both participating teams—Georgia Tech and Texas.

Tech remained a slight favorite. Along betting row they quoted 6 and 7 and that's as close as any of the Bowl battles of the past.

Word came, when the Georgia Tech team pulled into town, that Ralph Plaster, regular fullback, might not be able to play because of a knee injury and that Clint Castleberry, the sensation freshman star, would be performing with his knee in a brace.

On the other hand, not an injury hampered the Texas squad, strengthened through addition of several fine freshmen prospects. This is being done since the southwest conference voted to make first-year men immediately eligible.

Coach Bill Alexander and 18 of his Georgia Tech players came in Saturday. Bobby Dodd, assistant coach, arrives today with 17 more. The two units, though traveling separately, held a joint workout at Memphis last week.

Oregon Sport Notes

The Pacific coast conference's action in declaring freshmen eligible for varsity sports has changed the basketball picture sharply at the University of Oregon, tips Dick Strite, Eugene Register Guard writer.

Addition of a handful of Web-foot freshmen to the varsity "makes the difference between a very ordinary Oregon quintet to one with an outside chance for the northern division championship."

Continues Strite "with addition of Roger Wiley, the six-foot-eight-plus freshman from Bremerton, and Ed Dick, rugged yearling from The Dalles, we'd line up a starting five thusly: Wiley at center with Wally Borrevik in reserve; Bob Wren and Warren Taylor at forwards, with Ralph Fuhrman, Roy Seeborg and Dick as reserves; Don Kirsch at one guard position with his running mate and the reserves selected from a list that includes Al Popick, Bob Newland, Bob Reynolds, Sammy Crowell and Warren Christensen."

The added freshmen make possible a Web-foot team averaging around 6-4 in height.

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Pro-League All-Stars, Sammy Baugh Drop Reds

Baugh Fails To Appear for Pro Grid
Classic Which All-Stars Win, 17-14

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 28 (AP) The failure of Sammy Baugh, star of the champion Washington Redskins, to appear for yesterday's pro bowl football classic at Shibe park caused a furor that overshadowed the National league All-Stars 17 to 14 victory over the league champions.

Commissioner Elmer Layden ordered an investigation to bring out the full facts. Another league official explained: "From all we know Baugh might have had a legitimate excuse for not showing up. But so far we can find no legitimate reason for his not notifying us that he could not or was not coming."

Baugh declared at his Rotan, Tex. ranch home that "I tried my best to make the game. They were supposed to have a car ready for me in Sweetwater (about 30 miles from Rotan) so I could catch a plane out of Dallas about 11:30 p. m. Saturday night. The car was not there."

The announcement Baugh would not play was made late Saturday night. Many in the crowd of 18,671 knew nothing about it when they appeared at the park.

The game itself gave the Chicago Bears some measure of revenge for losing the league title to the Redskins two weeks ago. Lee Artoe, Bear tackle, provided the winning three points by kicking a 43-yard field goal on the second play of the last quarter. Artoe's mighty boot climaxed a furious six-minute period in which 24 of the 31 points were scored.

The Redskins took the lead in the first quarter on Ki Aldrich's 30-yard punt return for a touchdown. A 97-yard run by Pittsburgh's Bill Dudley after he intercepted a pass, tied the score in the third quarter. The All-Stars went ahead on John Petty's lunge from the two to cap a 51-yard advance, but the Redskins promptly tied it on a

East-Westers Work Passing Defensives

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 28 (AP)—Both eastern and western all-star football teams scheduled additional workouts on pass defense today but there was a greater note of urgency in the tactics for the westerners.

The teams which are training for the annual East-West Shrine charity game New Year's day drilled on aerial maneuvers yesterday before adjourning early for a sight-seeing trip.

The eastern team working out at Santa Clara pleased co-coaches Andy Kerr of Colgate and George Hauser of Minnesota with hurling by Paul Governall of Columbia, Steve Filipowicz of Fordham and Bill Daley of Minnesota. The Washington State college Cougars, losers by one point, 40 to 39, to Temple Saturday night, moved on to New York today and a Madison Square Garden clash tomorrow night with the New York university basketball team.

Another Pacific northwest five, Oregon State college, made an impressive New York showing in the garden Saturday night, defeating City College of New York, 45 to 34. Lewis Beck and Don Durdan, guards, tallied 14 and nine points apiece to lead their team. Oregon State led at the half 24-15. Marvin (Red) Blumenthal, a forward, tossed in a foul throw 30 seconds before the game's

end, to pull out Temple's victory.

The Owls trailed 25-23 with five minutes to go. Washington State tied the score twice, at 27 and 29-all, and a minute from the end field goals by Scott Witt and Gail Bishop of Washington State tied it up again at 39-all. Temple led at the half 18-14.

Bishop and Witt and Getchell, Temple, each tallied 11 points. Wyoming defeated LaSalle 58-32 in the other game. The attendance was 5422.
