

# ROTARIANS TO RUN JANUARY BOND CAMPAIGN

The Klamath Falls Rotary club will take over the war savings campaign in Klamath county in January, it was announced today by Andrew M. Collier, war savings chairman.

He said the club will provide the push for a \$249,000 quota. President DeLos Mills has appointed past presidents of the club as committee in charge, with Mitchell Tillotson as chairman.

**Cooperation Asked**

"We are determined that Klamath county shall make its quota every month this year, and January must start it all off right," said Collier. "We believe the Rotary club will give us a mark to shoot at."

Tillotson said that the club is asking the entire community to get behind the drive, and in many ways will call war savings to the attention of the public.

Sub-committees will be in charge of rural subscriptions, payroll deductions, lumber and industrial organizations, business houses, with a special women's section now being organized by Dr. J. M. Hilton.

**Fines Assessed**

As a part of the program, the club hopes to have a "victory center" devoted to the part the pine industries are playing in the war effort. The Western Pine association is cooperating in preparing this program, as well as members of the armed forces. The plan is to honor workers in the pine industry.

There will be radio messages from Rotarians nearly every day on the war savings themes, and every meeting of the club will be partly devoted to this effort. All Rotary fines in January will be assessed in bonds and stamps, it was announced.

## FBI Smashes "Terrible Touhy" Gang in Chicago

flashed on and the G-men called to Touhy, Banghart and Darlak: "Come out through the front door. Come out backwards and with your hands up. Banghart, you come first."

Then the door opened and Banghart, hands overhead, backed cautiously through the door.

Agents reached out from their apartment door facing that of the gangsters, grabbed him and wheeled him into their apartment where he was manacled.

Next they called for Touhy to come out, and then Darlak. All surrendered without a struggle.

Touhy wore brilliant red pajamas and his black hair had been turned blond with peroxide. A bottle of peroxide was found in the flat.

The FBI had taken an apartment directly across the hall from the gang's in the six-flat building. In it they stored an arsenal of tear gas, machine guns and high powered rifles.

In addition, they moved families from the second floor to the third so that they could be evacuated through a skylight in the event it was necessary to besiege the criminals with tear gas bombs to drive them out.

O'Connor and McInerney were slain last night when they opened fire on FBI agents who surrounded their hideout in the Norwood apartments on Leland avenue.

The FBI men ordered them to surrender peacefully. They answered by opening fire. G-men's bullets brought them down.

Hoover said two apartments used by the gang contained five revolvers, two sawed-off shotguns and one 30-30 rifle. All were loaded and extra rounds of ammunition were uncovered.

In the hunt so far, Hoover related, the federal agents have found \$13,533.27 of money hidden by the gang in various places. Several automobiles were found.

# BRITISH DRIVE AHEAD TOWARD BURMESE BASE

that Gen. Wavell had launched a major campaign to recapture Burma, but the swift retirement of Japanese troops at Rathaung suggested that the British might be inconsiderable force.

On the New Guinea front, Gen. Douglas MacArthur's headquarters announced that allied troops had deepened their wedge into Japanese lines in the Buna zone, with American and Australian jungle fighters beating off a desperate new enemy attempt to smash out of its trap.

After crushing the Japanese counterattack, allied troops lunged farther into the enemy's intricate system of fortifications along the dwindling beach corridor.

**Rabaul Raid**

Gen. MacArthur said Japanese warcraft—probably submarines—shelled allied lines at Buna village for five hours yesterday, starting at midnight, but caused no damage.

Allied airmen flying heavy B-24 Liberator bombers were credited with scoring three direct 500-pound bomb hits on a big Japanese cruiser off Rabaul, New Britain, leaving the warship in flames and probably destroyed.

Other allied fliers bombed the Gasmala airdrome in New Britain and carried out widespread attacks from Timor to Dutch New Guinea.

in the past week. They are following down the swampy coastal plain between the Bay of Bengal and the Arakan range of mountains. The Japs are reported retiring without putting up much of a fight.

This suggests that the British may be advancing in more force than has been indicated.

**THERE'S** a new development at Buna.

Jap warcraft, probably submarines, shelled our positions for five hours night before last and under this covering fire the Japs on the beach launched an attack, which was stopped. Our men then smashed forward in a counter-attack, still further narrowing the Japs' beach positions.

The nature of the fighting there can be understood from the announcement as a GAIN by our side of the wiping out of a few Jap snipers and a Jap listening post.

It's down to the hand-to-hand, man-to-man stage.

**IN** Tunisia, sharp clashes by allied patrols probing axis positions and continued assaults by our planes are reported. These are the usual preliminaries to something bigger. Torrential rains of the past few days are reported to be easing off into showers.

There's nothing new from Rommel.

**FRENCH SOMALILAND**, at the narrow southern end of the Red Sea (the water route from the Mediterranean to the Indian Ocean) comes over to our side. Axis submarines based at Djibouti, in French Somaliland, might have caused us some trouble, at least for a while. We're gradually getting our fingers on ALL of Africa.

some areas—the entire state of Arizona has only one—a spokesman said the staff members of the existing 142 are being deployed into rural communities to help adjust the rations of those who claim their allotment is insufficient. Making one-day stands, the field men are making prompt recommendations for adjustment to the district offices.

No further extension in the January 31 deadline for which temporary rations are valid is contemplated, the spokesman said. This deadline was announced last week; previously December 31 date had been fixed.

Gasoline rations issued between November 22 and January 31 on a temporary basis, to those farmers and others who had applied for certificates of need but had not received them, give the applicants all the gasoline they claim they need for that period. This amount will be subtracted from the final approved first quarter's ration, it was stated. The "first quarter" will cover the full period from November 22, 1942, when mileage rationing was first scheduled to go into effect, to March 31.
