BUREAU WILL LEASE SHEEPY LAKE LANDS

In an effort partially to eliminate the dust storms which sweep over the Klamath basin, the U. S. bureau of reclamation has decided to lease out some 6000 acres of land suitable for pasture or seeding to rye in the lower Klamath lake area of the Modoc unit, it was learned Tuesday.

Sealed bids will be received at the reclamation offices, federal building, January 14 at 2 p. m., and will be opened at that time. There is no irrigation system in this area, 2000 acres of which are west of Sheepy lake, 4000 acres south of that point.

All leases will be made for the period ending December 31, 1943, with the option to extend the term of the lease for successive additional periods of one year each, but in no event beyond December 31, 1945, reclamation engineers stated.
