

CITY FATHERS OKEH LICENSE FOR SKATELAND

The city council Monday night authorized a 1943 license for Skateland, local skating rink recently denied a license for the balance of 1942 on grounds it was a "breeding place for juvenile delinquency."

Action of the council was taken on recommendation of Police Chief Earl Heuvel. He said management of Skateland had agreed to certain changes in the set-up in the building and other details that met with police approval.

Commandos Praised
The council passed through first reading an ordinance making the distributorship fee on juke boxes at \$1000 for 40 machines, and \$25 for each machine over 40.

Mayor John Houston in a talk to the council warmly praised the efforts of the community to entertain Camp White soldiers over Christmas weekend and in particular heaped glowing approval upon the Commandos, local young women's service organization.

"These girls have helped make Klamath Falls distinctive in its hospitality to our fighting men," he said. "Their work is a real credit to this community."

Street Problem Talked
The mayor was authorized by the council to send a letter of commendation to the Commando organization.

In a discussion of street problems, Mayor Houston suggested that each councilman pick out a problem street in his ward and an effort will be made to work out a plan with the county road department on improving the street.

Councilman Bussman suggested that the street department provide flares for use of men working on streets at night.

BICYCLE LICENSE SALE UNDER WAY

Sale of bicycle licenses started Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock in the police judge's offices, city hall, and the sale will continue throughout the week up to January 1, from 3 to 5 p. m. it was announced.

Forms were distributed throughout the schools and all bicycle owners were asked to fill out these forms before coming to the police judge's office in order to speed up distribution of licenses.

All bike operators must have licenses on their machines by January 1, 1943. The price is \$5 cents.

The bound stories, crossword puzzles and ash trays are sent to the army and navy hospitals. The Christmas cards, bean bags, stuffed animals and dolls go to the Doernbecher hospital for crippled children. Stories and magazines go to the Shrine hospital and to the tuberculosis sanitarium at Salem.
