# RIISING COSTS BOOST WELFARE FEBRUARY FUND

Showing that the actual case load is lower, but that all costs have increased generally, the Klamath county public welfare commission Tuesday approved a February budget of \$14,375, which is slightly higher than January's, according to Mrs. Karl Urquhart, who has resumed her duties as director after a six weeks' illness.

The February budget figure includes soldier's and sailor's aid, as well as the permanent program of the welfare program, county hospital and infirmary, county farm and public assistance.

Cases have been totaling approximately 91 per month, with January showing an extremely low 74, according to Mrs. Urquhart, and the additional costs for February are explained by rising costs over last year. Hospital costs have increased approximately 40 per cent over January, 1941, food costs about 30 per cent; rent figures remain static, while clothing figures are undetermined.

Part of the increased hospital budget is due to the curtailment of medical service throughout the county, physicians whose numbers have been depleted by the armed forces finding it impossible to make as many outside calls as before.

**Sanders Arrested On Faulty Driving Charges Tuesday**

Charged with operating a car with improper vision, towit a frost covered windshield, police arrested John Sanders, Arcade hotel, on South Sixth street late Tuesday. Sanders was also charged with driving in a reckless manner. He gave his occupation as a truck driver. Chief of Police Earl Heuvel has issued frequent warnings to motorists who insisted upon driving with inadequately cleaned windshields in winter weather. Sanders posted \$27 bail.
