

CRYING NEED FOR TEACHERS TOLD AT MEET

MALIN—Klamath county principals and coaches meeting in Klamath Falls Tuesday night probed the problems of the school man from the 1943 basketball tournament to the crying need for teachers. Joe LeClair, president, introduced the guest speaker, A. C. Olsen of the Altamont Junior high school, recent delegate to the convention of Oregon state teachers at Portland. All schools of the county except Gilchrist were represented.

Olsen reported that to alleviate the shortage of teachers next year special one-year certificates will be offered capable persons by the state board of education, the certificates to be voided after the duration.

Games at Home
February 18 and 19 have been announced as dates for the district B school basketball tournament to be played at Altamont Junior high school in Klamath Falls, games played during the series to determine holder of the county title and the school that will be represented in the state contest. Included in the district is Lake county, title holders of Klamath county to play Lake county champions and Jackson county winners. Interscholar games played prior to the tournament are designated as practice games and have no bearing on the final decision.

Games are being scheduled with teams close at home, high school squads meeting town teams as well as other basin high school squads.

Salary Control Talked
Otis Johnson, Henley, was appointed to work out an improvement program for moving pictures in county high schools and more emphasis will be placed on mathematics this year than ever before, in the nationwide preparation for service of young men in the armed forces.

Discussed also was the organization of teachers for a more concerted part in the war effort and salary control.

January 29 will mark the end of the first semester for south end schools that were closed for one month during the potato harvest.

The next meeting will be held March 2. No meeting is scheduled for February.

Shipment of Parcels to Men Overseas Slashed

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8 (AP)—Announcing new army postal regulations drastically restricting the shipment of packages to soldiers overseas, Secretary of War Stimson said Thursday "I seem to have been a better promoter than I expected when I urged people to write to the soldiers."

Because of the enormous amount of space used to transport packages, Stimson said the army has ruled that beginning January 25, no package may be sent to a soldier overseas unless it contains an article which has been requested by the soldier, and the request has been approved by his commanding officer.

Damage Estimate in Willamette Flood Lowered

SALEM, Jan. 8 (AP)—The Salem-West Salem bridge, damaged by last week's flood, was reopened to pedestrian traffic today, while automobile traffic will be resumed tomorrow or Saturday, State Highway Engineer R. H. Baldock said today.

Baldock said damage to highways and bridges in the valley totals \$85,000, instead of \$100,000 as he had previously estimated.

Red Cross officials said damage estimates will be available in about 10 days.

McNary to Aid Flood Victims in Priority Ratings

SALEM, Jan. 8 (AP)—Senator Charles L. McNary telegraphed Governor Sprague today that he would aid Willamette valley farmers, who suffered severe damage in last week's flood, in obtaining priorities to repair the damage.

The senator said he would appeal to the war production board for any priorities requested.

Procedure Outlined for Gift Mail to Prisoners

CAMP WHITE, Ore., Jan. 8—Procedures for shipment of gift parcels to prisoners of war and interned civilians are outlined in a bulletin received by headquarters, Camp White, today from the board of economic warfare, office of exports.

A general license known as "G-PW-2" has been issued authorizing the exportation, by mail only, of gift parcels to members of the armed forces of the United States who are prisoners of war and to civilians who are nationals of the United Nations interned in enemy occupied territories. Such gift parcels are limited to those which may be sent under the general license. Applications which do not meet specifications for the general license will not be granted. Person desiring to send parcels under the general license may do so without applying to the board of economic warfare for an export license, which formerly was required, under the following provisions:

1. Packages must not exceed 11 pounds gross weight, 18 inches in length, or 42 inches in length and girth combined. Only one such parcel may be sent to each prisoner each 60 days. The contents of each package must be listed on a special form provided by the post office department and filed at the time of mailing.

The provost marshal general's office will furnish an official label in duplicate for parcels

going to members of the United States armed forces who are prisoners of war. Packages may not be shipped to the Orient at present, but when facilities are available to transport such packages to Japan and Japanese controlled territory, labels will be issued to the next of kin without request. Labels will be issued by their respective governments for packages sent to prisoners who are nationals of the British empire.

German authorities provide labels for packages to members of the armed forces of any of the United Nations other than the United States and the British empire. Gift parcels also may be sent to such prisoners in Italy or Italian controlled territory, but must bear a certificate in writing that the prisoner is known to be at the address given and that no package has been mailed to him by the sender within 60 days prior to the date of mailing, and that to the writer's knowledge no other package had been mailed to the prisoner in that period.

In all cases the sender must write in ink under the address: "General License 'G-PW-2,' Via New York, New York."

Gift parcels may not contain written or printed matter of any kind, and articles in glass containers or those which are hermetically sealed, or solder sealed tins or collapsible tin tubes, such as shaving cream or tooth paste are banned.

DSC AWARDED TO 49 YANK FLIERS

CAIRO, Jan. 8 (AP)—On windswept desert air fields strewn with the wreckage of axis planes, 49 additional American air force members received the distinguished flying cross today from Maj. Gen. Lewis H. Brereton, commander of United States air forces in the Middle East.

Lieut. Frederic E. Whitker of Bowling Green, Ohio, got a special citation for bringing home a badly damaged medium bomber from a raid in October after he was wounded in the leg.

Enemy antiaircraft fire hit Whitker and killed his bombardier. His plane burst into flames as he made a forced landing, but he helped extinguish the blaze. Whitker also received the purple heart for his wound.
