Polish Pianist To Appear Here

History of Artist Who Comes January Fifteenth To the Pelican Given in This Story

Witold Maluczynski is the brilliant young Polish pianist who made a whirlwind American debut on the evening of April twentieth, at Carnegie Hall, under the patronage of His Excellency Jan-Ciechanowski, Polish ambassador to the United States, and comes to Klamath Falls on Friday night, January fifteenth, under the banner of the Klamath Community Concert association.

Maluczynski is the last pupil of Paderewski. Born into a family of business rather than artistic traditions—the elder Maluczynski was on the Warsaw stock exchange—Witold Maluczynski only studied the piano as an avocation. He majored in law and philosophy at two Polish universities. Turynski, his piano teacher, persuaded Paderewski to invite the young man to play for him. An audition was arranged through Paderewski's political secretary, Sylwin Strakacz, now Polish consul in New York. After the audition Paderewski, impressed, urged Maluczynski to make music his career, and offered to become his teacher. Maluczynski, like most Poles, had an almost superstitious reverence for the great musician and statesman. After Paderewski's endorsement of his artistic gift, he had no hesitation in dedicating his life to it.

Completing his studies with the master, Maluczynski entered and won in the great international Chopin competition in Warsaw. A fellow contestant and winner of one of the other prizes was Colette Gaveau, a pretty, dark-eyed young Parisienne, member of the famous Gaveau family, manufacturers of France's most renowned pianos. In spite of professional rivalry, the two became friends. Three years later they were married.

As Maluczynski's artistic prestige grew, he gave concerts in most of the European capitals, including Warsaw, Vienna, Budapest, with the Philharmonic orchestra at the Royal opera, Brussels, Riga, London; he played throughout France, at Lyons, Marseille, Bordeaux, Biarritz, Nice, Monte Carlo, and in Paris, where he made his debut with the Pasdeloup concert orchestra conducted by Albert Wolff, followed by a recital at the Opera Comique. At the outbreak of the war, Maluczynski was concertizing in the Balkans. He canceled his tour and came home, hindered, of course, at every national border he had to cross. He arrived in Warsaw just in time to witness the debacle of Poland's resistance.

Maluczynski and his wife, with their dog Arturek, who by this time had joined their household, escaped to Paris. The day the nazis entered the French capital, the Maluczynskis again fled just ahead of the invaders. The Gaveau family were warned by a friend in the French aviation that the German army was much nearer than anyone believed. Maluczynski and his wife managed to get a car, in which they and Arturek left the city, along with thousands of other refugees. Running out of gas, they had to take

a train and were barely settled on it when German bombers strafed the railroad. The whole train was in confusion. Arturek, terrified, ran off into the crowd. Mlle. Maluczynski in pursuit. The three were separated, and reunion did not come until the next day. The Maluczynskis were among the fortunate refugees who got to Lisbon. A South American music lover, stranded there also, recognized the pianist. He immediately sent off a cable to his friend Bernardo Iriberry, a leading South American impresario, urging him to arrange a tour for Maluczynski. Iriberry wired a prompt confirmation. It was three months later, however, that the Maluczynskis were able to get passage on a very small and crowded steamer. The voyage was long and stormy, made still more harrowing by two submarine attacks.

Arrived in South America, Maluczynski gave twelve concerts in Buenos Aires, achieving spectacular success; his sensational reception brought him another long series of appearances in Rio de Janeiro and other capitals. Mme. Maluczynski also was heard in recital. Arturek, not to be outdone, earned his share of family glory by winning first prize for his breed at the Buenos Aires dog show.

Yehudi Menuhin, passing through Montevideo during his own tour of South America, heard one of Maluczynski's concerts. The violinist was so enthusiastic over the art of the Polish pianist that he went backstage and urged him to come to the United States. On Menuhin's return to New York, he described Maluczynski's playing in such glowing terms that Columbia Records, Inc., manager of Menuhin, cabled an invitation for Maluczynski to come to New York.

The pianist received the cable in Lima, Peru, where he and his wife were just recovering from a good shaking-up by an earthquake shock. The United States! They had always wanted to go there. Acceptance was cabled at once, and a few days later the pianist and his wife were en route by air. Arturek followed by freighter. The Maluczynski odyssey was nearing an end.
