

League Has Meet

Merit System Bill and Civil Service Discussed Monday

Background of civil service in general was presented to the Klamath County League of Women Voters Monday afternoon, January 4, by Mrs. Leo Sagehorn, while the history of the merit system bill to come before the present Oregon state legislature, was outlined by Mrs. Harlan P. Bosworth.

The merit system bill is a project of the state League of Women Voters.

At the time federal civil service was inaugurated in Washington, D. C., Mrs. Sagehorn pointed out, the government was primarily interested in qualifications of an individual for appointive office, ignoring political affiliations.

Later, in the administration of Thomas Jefferson, she continued, those whose political coloring differed from the administration were removed. This was done to strengthen the party, increasing patronage until coming on down to the time of Andrew Jackson, the Spoils system came into full sway.

It took the death of President Garfield, murdered by a disappointed office seeker, to start a change of policy, and eventually the civil service law in its present usable and workable form was passed in 1883. Mrs. Sagehorn continued in her analysis.

Since that time, civil service has extended to state government, with 19 states having adopted the merit system. Louisiana is the latest state to adopt the system. In the west, California has had state civil service for some time and in Washington a merit system bill will be presented to the 1943 legislature as it will be in Oregon. Outstanding gains in states having merit system are: Savings in payroll and securing better trained personnel for public service.

Mrs. Bosworth, in giving a realistic approach to, and study of the present Merit System bill, pointed out that it is civil service, developed to the highest degree. She gave advantages of the Merit system to state employees as follows: Stabilized employment; promotions; better working conditions; pensions; in-service training; freedom from political exploitation; service ratings which inspire efficient handling of duties, and workers selected on truly democratic basis.

Merit system makes public service definitely more attractive, gives a career service, and provides interest for skilled workers, Mrs. Bosworth declared.

An outstanding argument against the bill is the appropriation carried with it, amounting for two years to \$144,000 or \$150,000. The state is in good financial position now, however, Mrs. Bosworth pointed out, and it will be one and a half or two years before the system goes into operation, if passed. That much time is required to secure the personnel director, set up the technical and clerical staff, prepare compensation and classification plans, examinations, etc. Skilled material is now sparse, but the establishment of Merit system will provide a means for obtaining good employees from the skilled, trained thousands of people who will be released from war industries and the armed forces at the end of the war. Also merit system will avoid over-staffing after the war when returning soldiers must be put to work, Mrs. Bosworth continued.

Although the League of Women Voters does not believe that any type of preferential clause is acceptable in a true merit system bill, Mrs. Bosworth said, it is necessary to incorporate a veterans' clause. The League will urge a compromise that no more than five points be added to the passing grade. Veterans' preference is unfair to the veterans themselves, the League believes, since there is a limited number of positions to be filled and, if incompetent workers take the jobs, the bulk of the veterans, who are taxpayers, suffer from it.

Jack Almetzer, manager of the Oregon state employment service, which already functions under the merit system, also spoke to the League Monday afternoon. He told of its operation and pointed out advantages of the plan.

The next meeting of the League will be held Monday evening, January 18, at eight o'clock, in the small club room of the city library, according to an announcement from the president, Mrs. Everett R. Dennis, who presided Monday afternoon, and introduced the speakers.
