

GRAVELING OF STREETS EYED BY CITY DADS

A proposed street improvement program, covering stretches of street in every ward, was outlined to the city council Monday night by City Engineer E. A. Thomas. The plan is to use gravel on these streets, with abutting property owners paying the costs which are reduced by obtaining the gravel from the county.

The streets were suggested by the councilmen in each ward. Such work can be done on any street where property owners will cooperate in the finances, it was stated.

Here are the suggested streets, with the amount involved at a cost of \$1.27 a yard for gravel: Kila street, from Nevada to Oregon avenue, \$142.

Third street from Grant to California, \$281.94.

Michigan avenue from Esplanade to Main street, \$180.34.

Eldorado street, from Del Moro to Van Ness avenue, \$200.66.

Seventh street from Oak to Willow, \$76.20.

Orchard Way, from near Mitchell to Garden avenue, \$119.38.

Orchard avenue, from East Main to near Mitchell, \$123.20.

Reclamation avenue, from Mitchell to Washburn Way, \$264.16.

California avenue, from Third to Mt. Whitney, \$76.20.

Earle street, from Pacific Terrace to second alley above, \$80.

Thomas said this type of improvement is not the best, but would bring some relief from muddy conditions. He said the city could not be obligated to replace gravel on these streets later on, or to carry on a maintenance program as it does on surfaced streets.

It was suggested that in case property holders want to get together on an improvement job, one of them be named to collect the money on a pro rata basis. Interested property owners should see their councilmen.

BUSINESS WOMEN HEAR BILL TALKED

Mrs. H. P. Bosworth Jr. was guest speaker at the Business and Professional Women's club January 4, discussing the merit system bill to be introduced in the Oregon state legislature this term and stressing the importance of women taking an active part in government.

Introduced by Grace Kintgen, legislative chairman, Mrs. Bosworth outlined the bill and pointed out that no legislation is possible unless public opinion is expressed. The measure would establish a civil service system at the state level, provides for competitive examinations and a six-month probationary period.

Sponsored by the American Civil Service League, the League of Women Voters and a committee from the AFL, the measure would affect 7720 state workers. Similar legislation has been passed by 19 states, Mrs. Bosworth said.

Preceding Mrs. Bosworth's talk, Isabelle Bernier led the club collect, after the flag salute and group singing of "America."

Gas Rationing Brings Proposal to Ease Klamath Falls Parking Limit Rulings

A proposal that the city relax its parking limit restrictions now that gas rationing has entered the downtown traffic picture was presented to the city council last night.

The proposer was Roland Wright, real estate man, who recently received an overtime parking ticket for parking his car on North Fifth street. After considerable discussion, the matter was referred to the police department and street committee, and Mayor Houston said that if it is found desirable to make some changes "they will be made."

Wright said that present traffic conditions do not justify the parking restrictions. Parkers, he said, waste gasoline by going out after the policeman has marked their tires and moving the cars around the block or up a "notch" to change the tire markings and avoid arrest.

The street where his car was parked, he said, is nearly vacant much of the time. He reminded the council it had recently requested motorists not to park in the muddy lot at Fifth and Pine streets and he added, "My office safe won't hold my car."

Mayor Houston explained that the purpose of parking restrictions is to keep the streets free of cars parked for long periods, in order that there will be parking space for persons trading there. Councilman Bussman said that there will be more business in Klamath Falls this January than a year ago. Wright replied that he believes much of the trading being done now is by persons "hoarding" against possible rationing or shortages later on, and said he doesn't believe there will be as much business or traffic later on.

At any rate, he said, he would suggest eliminating parking checking on side streets.

The city council adopted a report of the police committee recommending a \$600 license fee for juke box distributors, that fee covering 20 machines. A fee of \$30 will be charged for each additional machine.

This is a compromise between the old fee of \$400 and a \$1000 fee for 40 machines, recently proposed by the committee. J. C. O'Neill, attorney for E. G. Lewis, a juke box distributor, objected last week to the higher fee, asserting it was discriminatory and tended to create a monopoly here.

Mayor Houston appointed citizen members of a committee to study a proposed occupations tax for Klamath Falls. Members are Dr. James Hilton, L. L. Lombard, George Metz and Charles Seavey. Councilman Keller is a council member of the committee.

The mayor announced that John Sandemeyer will replace Sam Ritchey as chairman of the citizens' traffic safety committee. Ritchey, who asked relief from the chairmanship, will remain on the committee.

Howard Barnhisel was given a leave of absence from the recreation committee.

Mayor Houston said he would withhold for another week appointment of a building inspector. Police Judge Harold Franey will handle the work temporarily. The mayor recently suggested Franey might handle both the building inspection and police judge's offices, but a charter provision prevented Franey from taking both duties.

Police Judge Harold Franey appointed Alexis Runyan as deputy city auditor, and named Dr. Calvin Hunt police judge pro tem.

At the suggestion of Councilman Bussman, the council went on record urging local people to dig up vacant lots the coming spring for victory gardens. Use of city-owned lots, and privately-owned vacant lots as well, was proposed.

The street committee and city engineer were given power to act with regard to a proposed hand rail along the sidewalk on Main street from Riverside to Carroll street. The traffic safety committee suggested the railing, but a question arose as to whether its installation is a proper city function or should be done by abutting property owners.

The mayor and council agreed to sign letters to the state legislative delegation asking support of the efforts of the League of Oregon Cities to get a larger share of gas tax and liquor moneys for cities.

The city received \$150 from the Southern Pacific company for two lots in Industrial addition, which the city is to dedicate to street purposes in lieu

of other lots used by the SP for storage purposes.

The Rotary club was given permission to stand two logs in front of the Vox theatre as a part of a war bond program, and also to use a loud speaker in boosting war bond sales.

City Engineer Thomas announced that improved restroom facilities are to be installed at the municipal airport.

It was reported that T. Molatore has agreed to move a fence and shrubbery along Earle street adjoining the triangular city-owned property at Esplanade, Eldorado and Earle street. The fence and shrubbery were installed, under some arrangement made years ago, on city property.

Action Expected on Inspector, City Judge Appointments

TULELAKE—City councilmen meeting next Monday night will name a successor, it is expected, to City Judge John Cortez, resigned, and Rance Stover, city plumbing and electrical inspector who left Monday for Portland for induction in the Seabees.

Cortez resigned to serve as Siskiyou county justice of the peace in Tulelake township.
