McKenna Emphasizes Need for Sales Tax in Oregon

SALEM, Jan. 14 (P) — Sen. Coe A. McKenna, Portland, told a Salem club that a sales tax is needed vitally in Oregon, and that the state income tax should be reduced.

Asserting that sales taxes have solved the financial problems in California and Washington, McKenna said a sales tax would attract industries to Oregon because it would afford property tax relief.

He proposed a flat income tax rate of 3 per cent, compared with present rates of 2 to 8 per cent, the latter rate being on larger incomes.
