

DELINQUENCY IN DRAFT TO BE PROSECUTED

SALEM, Jan. 14 (Special)—Start of a campaign to locate for compliance or prosecution all Oregon registrants listed by local boards as delinquents was announced by Colonel Elmer V. Wootton, state director of Selective Service, following a conference with United States District Attorney Carl C. Donagh and representatives of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Willful violators of the Selective Training and Service act can expect speedy prosecution and stringent penalties, Donagh has assured the director. Maximum penalty under the act is 5 years in prison or \$10,000 fine, or both.

Chance Given

Although willful violators of the act can expect no leniency, Colonel Wootton indicated that registrants who had become delinquent only through unintentional neglect to notify local boards of change of address or other unintentional minor infractions of the law would receive less stringent treatment.

"Any person who voluntarily reports to his local board during the month of January, 1943 and whose delinquency was not willful is likely to be given a chance to comply with his obligations and not be prosecuted," Colonel Wootton said. "In the event such persons have been listed by the local board as delinquent but not yet reported to the United States district attorney, the decision will rest with the local board. Decision as to the prosecution of registrants reported to the United States district attorney as delinquents will rest with the attorney although the local board is authorized to make recommendations."

Nazi U-Boat Production Outstrips Destruction

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14 (AP)

The German navy, it was learned on high authority Wednesday, is turning out submarines faster than the sea and air forces of the United Nations can destroy them. This despite the heavy bombing of German factories from British and American bases in England.

At the same time, the United Nations are building cargo and transport ships faster than they are being sunk. They are also building escort and patrol vessels—destroyers, corvettes and subchasers—at about top speed.

The number of enemy submarines operating in the Atlantic at any one time is more than 100, which represents possibly from one-third to one-fourth of their actual sub strength. The rest of their undersea craft are either operating in other waters or are at home for repairs and crew relief.

These were described by qualified authorities, who cannot be identified by name, as being among the reasons why the U-

boat is considered by the navy to be, in the words of Admiral Harold R. Stark, its "first enemy." They are reasons, too, why United Nations shipping losses still are, in Stark's opinion, "something to be mighty uncomfortable about."

MILEAGE CHANGES SHOULD BE NOTED

Any change in job or residence which affects a motorist's mileage rationing requirements, should be reported to the local rationing board within five days, the state OPA office announced today.

If your new job puts you closer to your work, you won't need so much gasoline, said the OPA, and your mileage rationing coupon book should be adjusted accordingly.

Also, if you sell your automobile or decide to jack it up for the duration, your coupon book should be returned to the local board within five days. In case of a bona fide transfer of a car, the new buyer may apply for a ration book in his own behalf, OPA explained.

When you quit using your car, the ration, except for the basic A rations, expire, and unused coupons should be returned, said the OPA. The same thing applies to boats or other equipment for which rations have been issued, it was explained.
